PUPILS HOPE TO KEEP PROFESSOR

HIGH SCHOOL SCHOLARS CIRCULATE PETITION FOR RE-ELECTION OF THE LANGUAGE TEACHER.

GRADUATES SAY SOME KIND WORDS ABOUT HIM

Strong Sentiment Shown in Favor of Retaining the Services of This Well-Known, Kindly Disposed and Polished Gentleman—He is the Master of Many Languages—Will Probably Get Place.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, May 23.—If the sentiment of the people of Anaconda means anything, Prof. Redeker, teacher of languages in the High School, will retain his position.

It will be remembered that all the old faculty of the High School was discharged at the last meeting of the board, with the exception of Prof. Redeker, who, however, at the suggestion of Prof. Koontz was also to be removed. This did not seem to be the opinion of all the members of the board, however, and the matter was laid over.

Since that time there has been an unusually strong sentiment shown by all classes for the retention of the professor, who is a graduate of a famous German university, a linguist of remarkable ability and a scholarly and polished gentleman. He was for some time teacher in languages in the Helena High School, and is recognized among the best educators of the state as a competent and efficient teacher.

Superintendent Koontz stated that Prof. Redeker was lacking in his discipline and was severe with the High School pupils.

One young girl in particular whom it was stated the professor struck, strenuously denies the statement.

Now comes a petition signed by the pupils of the High School almost unanimously asking for the retention of the old gentleman, whom they all love, and in whose scholarship they have an abiding confidence, stating that he showed no severity to any of them. Members of the graduating class have also signed the petition and strenuously deny that there has been any severity shown them by the professor.

Rarely has anything of the kind attracted such attention; business men and men of all classes joining in their protest at the recommendation of superintendent that the professor be discharged.

It is not known whether the matter will come up at the meeting tomorrow evening, but it is not improbable that in spite of the recommendation of the superintendent, Prof. Redeker will be retained on the staff.

COUNTY ATTORNEY ASKS RELEASE OF PRISONER

Not Sufficient Evidence Against Henry Jackley to Warrant Continuing the Prosecution.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, May 23.—In the district court yesterday afternoon County Attorney Duffy made a motion asking for leave not to file an information against Henry Jackley who was arrested several days ago, charged with having stolen \$8 from the person of John Gallagher.

Jackley was given a hearing in the police court and was bound over to the district court for trial in the sum of \$500. County Attorney Duffy was not present at the time and when his attention was called to the matter, he at once began an investigation.

After looking up the facts in the case he decided that the evidence against Jackley was not of sufficient weight to warrant a continuance of the prosecution and doing so would be putting the county to a needless expense.

So he made the motion asking for the release of Jackley who has been confined in the county jail.

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MEDICOS' CLOSING DAY IN ANACONDA

ORDINANCE ALL READY—NOW NEED DOG CATCHER

It is a Job That Has Few Applicants and the Emoluments Not Enough for the Abuse.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, May 23.—Dog tags are having a heavy sale at this town. The revised dog license ordinance has just gone into effect, and eight license tags were sold yesterday.

Since the beginning of the year 34 licenses have been sold to people who have a canine member in the family whom they desire to save sacred and unscathed from the ubiquitous and irrelevant dog-catcher.

Under the old license there were 26 tags disposed of and under the new, eight.

The new dog tariff is reduced considerably. Heretofore licenses for male dogs were \$3 each, and licenses for female dogs \$5. Now the rate is \$2 for the one and \$3 for the other.

All that is needed now is a dogcatcher. Dogcatchers are rare birds in Anaconda. Only a man of tough heart can stand the wear and tear, and such men are difficult to draw into the vocation.

Continually is the daily fool of the dog-catcher and the emoluments are not too generous.

MAY COURT TERM HERE IS FINISHED

JUDGE NAPTON TO SPEND REMAINDER OF THE MONTH IN DISPOSING OF LEFT OVER CASES.

WATER RIGHT CASE IS NOT READY FOR TRIAL

Many Civil Causes to Be Tried in Granite County Next Month—Criminal Trials Have Been Numerous There for the Past Year—Deer Lodge County Court Calendar Is Cleared Up.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, May 23.—In the district court this morning the hearing of two minor civil cases by Judge Napton cleared up the calendar for this term, except for miscellaneous cases that may come up before June 1.

The reason of this early finishing of the business of the May term of court is because of the continuance of the water right case of Peter Gessen vs. William Norton et al., in which there are more than 40 defendants.

If this case had been tried during this term it would have taken up at least two weeks' time, but as it was continued until the next term of court, the other regular business was quickly finished.

Landry Case. It may be that the Landry case will be argued this term, and it has also been suggested that the matter be submitted in brief.

Which will be the method followed has not yet been decided by the attorneys in the case.

June 1.—Judge Napton will open court in Granite county.

During the past year criminal cases have been most prolific in that county. So much so, in fact, that hardly a civil case has been before the court. The result is that there are a large number of civil cases to take up the time, it is probable that many of the civil cases will be disposed of.

The search term of court in Granite county was entirely taken up by the Hunter and Wilson murder trials and it seems that a similar condition has been the rule for many months.
