He was for some time teacher in languages in the Helena High School, and is recognized among the best educators of the state as a competent and efficient teacher, Superintendent Koontz stated that Prof. Redeker was lacking in his discipline and was severe with the High School purils

pils.

One young girl in particular whom it was stated the professor struck, strenuously denies the statement.

Now comes a petition signed by the pupils of the High School almost unani-

pupils of the High School almost unani-mously asking for the retention of the old gentleman, whom they all love, and in whose scholarship they have an abiding confidence, stating that he showed no se-verity to any of them. Members of the graduating class have also signed the pe-tition and strenuously deny that there has been any severity shown them by the pro-fessor.

Rarely has anything of the kind at-tracted such attention; business men and men of all classes joining in their pro-
