ANACONDAS MAY GO OVER TO CAPITAL

MAYOR CANNOT LOBBY FOR MUNICIPALITY, AND IT IS UP TO THE CITIZENS TO SEE TO IT.

Anaconda, Jan. 17.—Several of the progressive citizens of Anaconda will spend the better part of next week in the Capital City. There is much legislation that the city of Anaconda is vitally interested in and it is felt to be the duty of someone to be present.

Owing to the objections of one or two members of the city council the committee appointed by the mayor will not attend, and it is therefore up to some of the progressive citizens to go.

It is proposed to it possible secure the passage of a law combining the county and city governments. Since this scheme was first proposed in the Inter Mountain some weeks ago it has been seriously discussed by many of the heavy taxpayers, and the conclusion has been arrived at that it is the only thing to do. Every possible argument is in favor of the plan, and there is yet hope that such a measure will be passed by the present legislature.

It is pointed out that if the consolidation is perfected then much of the legislation now demanded for the benefit of the city would be altogether unnecessary. The matter is considered of so much importance that many of the heaviest taxpayers in the city feel that they can afford to pay their own expenses to Helena for the purpose of urging the passage of the measure.

She swore to the complaint but afterwards asked to have it withdrawn and a charge of undue intimacy was then placed against both of them.

ANTI-TREATERS IN CITY OF ANACONDA

LEAGUE STARTED BY THE PAULIST FATHERS IS WELL REPRESENTED HERE.

Anaconda, Jan. 17.—An organization having its origin in County Wexford, Ireland, has many members in Anaconda. It is called the Anti-Treating League and it has taken St. Patrick for its patron.

Less than one year ago it induced the Gaelic League, the last meeting of which was held in Dublin, to endorse its efforts as tending to eradicate "one of the most prolific sources of intemperance and a world-wide evil."

The movement was started here by the Paulist Fathers some months ago and several hundred people signed the pledge. The league does not attempt to hinder anybody from taking a drink himself if he pays for it, though it qualifies this by making its members promise "not to be guilty of the sin of intemperance." But the chief pledge that the members take is "Not to take a treat from another, nor to give one himself in any place where drink is sold, whether public house, saloon or hotel."

The pledge does not hinder a member from offering a drink to friends in his own house nor from taking one himself at the house of a friend. It does not prevent him from buying a drink for himself. It only bars buying drinks for others.

In token of these principles members are requested to wear the badge of the league, which is a shamrock leaf in green enamel with three small shields bearing the initials of the league. Total abstainers may wear cream colored shields. All of the members are expected to renew their pledges on St. Patrick's day.

It is understood that an effort will be made to extend the field of the league operations in this state in the near future. At present Anaconda is the only city or town in the state having any considerable number of members.

ANNIE SMITH VS. THE GREAT NORTHERN RAILWAY

Case Dismissed by Judge Napton as Having Been Settled—What the Litigation Was All About.
