NOVELTIES IN THE MARKET

Dangerous Toys Calculated to Please Children, Both Old and Young, on the Day of Noise.

New York, July 3.—This Fourth of July there will be "money to burn," thanks to the wonderful prosperity that is spreading over the country, and Young America is going to burn it with a vengeance.

The beginning of a set piece is a drawing, which is handed over to a carpenter to be reproduced in strips of wood fastened together with glue and nails.

Various elements are employed to give different colors to the fire, and these are mostly salts of metals—copper for blue, barium for green, sodium for yellow.

Rockets require more skill in their manufacture than any other kind of fireworks. The pasteboard case must be of a certain diameter, in proportion to its length.

The stars are little packets made of various compositions, so as to produce fire of different colors when ignited.

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The Dragon Rocket. The revolving dragon rocket discharges fire dragons, which remain suspended in the air and swing in circles in the midst of colored fires.

The Starry Shower. It is necessary that the explosive compound shall be burned through at just the moment when the rocket has reached its highest point, so that the stars or golden rain may be discharged with the effectiveness necessary to make the spectators say: "Oh!"

There are several parlor fireworks nowadays and one of these is the "snake in the grass." When burning it produces a large bunch of grass. You can actually see it grow and presently a big serpent emerges when it and crawls along the carpet.
