WEISS OPPOSES ANY CHANGE

Butte Rabbi Talks of Making Sunday the Jewish Sabbath. "In your issue of yesterday," said Rabbi Weiss, today, to the Inter Mountain, "you have partially misquoted me in my remarks of the proposed changing of the Jewish sabbath from Saturday to Sunday. The words 'should the members of the Butte congregation see their way clear to hold services on Sunday rather than on Saturday,' etc., are not mine, even by implication. We are not guided by a hierarchy, but we are by tradition. 'To forsake any misapprehension as to my view, I beg to say that I am unalterably opposed to any change of the historical sabbath.'"

CROSSES COUNTRY ON POWER BICYCLE

GEORGE A. WAYMAN, WHO STARTED FROM 'FRISCO, REACHES NEW YORK.

New York, July 7.—George A. Wayman, a motor cyclist, has reached this city on his machine from San Francisco and has the distinction of being the first man to cross the American continent on a power-driven vehicle. He had ridden, pedaled and pushed his machine from San Francisco to New York in 50 days, including stops. Wayman's route was through Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Pennsylvania and New York.
