RIBBONS AND RARITIES.

The Big Flowers and Long Streamers of the Millinery of Easter.

How Jet and Rhinestones Add to the Glitter of the Fashionable Costume.

And How Lace is Swathed in Many Encircling Folds—The Fashionable Family of Greens.

NEW YORK, APRIL 2.—IT IS CERTAINLY not the right thing to study hats when Patti is doing her part in the middle-aged best in "La Traviata," but I own I did neglect Viola for a space last evening to consider spring millinery. The impression that April headgear makes, as you see it in an audience, is one of very big and very soft, dew-dropped flowers and of excessively long streamers. One woman in every three within the range of my opera glass had so many ribbons and so much lace behind that she was obliged to take the accumulations round into her lap and set guard over them. In at least half a dozen near by instances the floating curls would have reached the floor.

Hat crowns, I noted, with a wonder that refused to let the everlasting "why" be satisfied by fashion's invariable and only answer, "because," were either microscopic and flat or microscopic and tall. The flat crowns were few but pronounced; the flat crowns were many and made of jet in a majority of instances. Both tall crowns and flat crowns had perpendicular bows—never a great number of them—for trimming, at the extreme rear; and wired apparently to the tallest bow, or else standing out from every suspicion of support, like a New Eng-

land spinster, was a straight and sky-piercing flower stem with an immense jonquil or fleur-de-lis stretching up from the top of it on tiptoe.

With the jet crowns went lace brims, Irish point ordinarily. With the jet went also, and not always harmoniously, rhinestones. As, for example, in the nearest box sat a pretty blonde in green. Her attendant again discovered something the matter with a glittering hairpin, and, ob-

ediently, she bent her head to have the trouble remedied. This means, of course, that she was taller than her knight, but in New York such a disproportion is getting so common that we do not find it an incongruity.

However, the bending of her head discovered a glittering star of diamonds (or rhinestones) as her hat crown, with needles of jet radiating from it. The hat brim was of white lace, with one huge, ragged, brownish-yellow chrysanthemum scattering its petals over the back, and one streamer of lace, another of green watered ribbon.
