Corn and Wheat Show Up Better.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—The October returns to the statisticians of the department of agriculture make the general condition of corn as not materially different from that of last month, it being 64.2 against 63.4 in September, a gain of eight-tenths of one point. In most of the southern states the condition of corn has fallen since the last report, but in some of the western states there have been slight gains in the condition. The returns of yield per acre of wheat indicate a production of about 13.1 bushels, being 1.8 bushels greater than last October.
