## DON'T OWN THE TOWN

Judge Knowles Decides Against J. A. Carter in His Suit for Valuable Helena

Property-

HE CLAIMED PART OF THE TOWNSITE

The Court Holds, However, That He Has No Ground on Which to Base His Suit.

Judge Knowles, in the United States court, yesterday handed down four decisions, one of which was in the important case of J. A. Carter versus J. D. Thompson and others. It involves a large slice of the townsite of Helena. large slice of the townsite of Helena, which Carter laid claim to on the ground that the land was mineral and known to be such at the time patent was issued to the probate judge. The

was offered for sale at public auction. Complainant has not noticed the difference between the statutes which pro-vide for the pre-emption of public lands and the one providing for the sale of such lands for townsite purposes, and the statute for the private sale of lands.

"In the case of Davis vs. administrator of Wiebold the supreme caurt, in speaking of the effect of an exception in grant of mineral lands, said as to the effect of a patent, "The grant or patent when issued would thus be held to carry with it the determination of the proper with city that the land patented was with it the determination of the proper authorities that the land patented was not subject to the exception stated.' In the case of Barden vs. Northern Pacific, the supreme court held that it was within the province of the land department to inquire into the character of lands when issuing a patent therefor, as to whether it was mineral or not. And if land were determined to be non mineral, this determination would be mineral this determination would be conclusive in the absence of fraud, im-position or mistake. The court says upon this point: Their judgment in such cases is like that of other special tribunals upon matters within their ex-clusive jurisdiction, unassailable except

clusive jurisdiction, unassailable except by direct proceeding for its correction or annulment."

"The conclusion is that the land granted to M. F. Truett in trust for the Helena townsite must be classed as non mineral. It was so determined by the land department. This determination cannot be attacked in a collateral proceeding. This was so held in the case of Barden vs. Northern Pacific. If any fraud was practiced or any mistake of law or fact occurred in issuing the patent to Truett, complainant cannot take advantage of this. He had no rights at that time to be effected by either the fraud or mistake. His rights, if any, fraud or mistake. His rights, if any, accrued, according to his own showing. accrued, according to his own showing, twenty-one years after issuing of the patent. The supreme court has fully decided this matter in the cases of Vance vs. Burbank and Bohall vs. Dilla. The only way this patent can be set aside or annulled is by a direct proceeding instituted by the United States for some fraud practiced on it on account of some mistake of fact or law occurring when the patent was issued. Complainant therefore by his own showing presents facts to the court which show that he is not entitled to recover in this case.

There is another point which I have not discussed in this case. The com-plainant has only a placer mining right. This may be only a license to work the ground located or it may amount to an casement. Whatever the right is it can only be acquired in public land, not in land that is already patented. But ad-mit that complainant has this license or and that complainant has this license or easement, with only such a title can he institute proceedings to annul a patent of the United States to this ground; I think not; I do not think he has suffi-cient interest in the land to justify him cient interest in the land to justify him in maintaining such an action as this. He has only a very limited interest in the land, if any, and only to the extent his interest is interfered with can he maintain a suit to remove a cloud therefrom, or to quiet a title thereto. If only a license as some authorities maintain he would have no such interests, for he would have no title to be quieted. "The demurrers in this case are sustained and the bill dismissed at complainant's costs."

Judge Knowles also overruled the demurrer to the complaint in the case of E. A. Penrose versus the Pacific Mutual Life Insurance company. Mrs. Penrose is the widow of W. J. Penrose, who was murdered in Butte some years ago. He had a \$5,000 policy on his life in the Pacific, which the company refused to pay. Mrs. Penrose brought suit, and the company demurrer to the complaint on the ground that it did not state facts sufficien to constitute a cause of action. Judge Knowles overruled the demurrer. The location of the claim under which Carter asserts title was made Sept. 7, 1893. The townsite patent was issued June 15, 1872.
