## MORE TIMBER SOLD BY GOVERNMENT

### LARGE CONTRACT ON FLATHEAD RIVER TO BE ADVERTISED FOR SALE SOON.

The government has several more timber contracts to close and one of these is a 25,000,000 feet of lumber sale on the South fork of the Flathead river at the northern end of the Flathead national forest. At the present time District Forester W. B. Greeley and D. T. Mason, associate district forester in silviculture, are in the Flathead forest going over with the supervisor and rangers the forest management to be adopted in the cutting of this timber. Mr. Greeley will return to Missoula about June 7, but Mr. Mason will remain in the field for a short time longer.

During the last few months the timber sales in the national forests have been gradually increasing, until now the total income from such contracts and sales amounts to about \$400,000 a year. When the time in which these recent sales have been made is considered this amount is very large and it is expected to have this amount more than doubled within the next year and a half. This amount of \$400,000 is about half of the sum required for the running expenses of the district forestry offices and it is only during the last year that this has been available. However, at present the forestry department is under a heavy load of expense in doing work which is not producing any revenue. The forest policy of the United States is of such recent conception that much of the work is that of organization and promotion. The forests had to be surveyed and the timber scaled, maps had to be made of the topography and forest areas within the national forests, trails, headquarters, lookouts, patrols, ranger stations had to be established and claims examined—in short, all this preliminary work necessary with the forming of national forests must be finished before the government is in a position to receive the best returns from the forest lands. The forest officials anticipate the completion of this preliminary work within the next few years and from then on will push forward the most valuable work of practical forestry.

## ADDITIONS PLANNED FOR COLLEGE PLAY

The university students are working hard with their play, "The Malad Imaginaire," which is to be put on Tuesday, June 7. Several new features have been added since the first performance. A special college song is to be sung after the third act, and several other new specialties are to be added. The Gypsy dance, which took so well on April 22, when the play was first given, is to be repeated. Misses Corbin, Wright and Stewart have charge of the training of the gypsies and the addition of a few new steps will make this one of the most attractive features of the evening. The orator will again appear and give his few words of introduction. Mr. Thayer Stoddard is to take this part again. Light refreshments will be served between the second and third acts. This was a new thing at the time of the first production, but proved to be so successful that it will no doubt be a permanent feature of the university plays.

## IN THE THEATERS

The story of "For Mother's Sake," which was presented at the Family theater last evening by Dick P. Sutton's No. 1 company, is really a very different rural drama from those one is accustomed to see. The atmosphere is strictly rustic, and a wonderful amount of rural philosophy is indulged in by the different characters. Don Churchill, as the simple old farmer, was more than satisfactory. His makeup was good, and not the least bit exaggerated. The play will be repeated tonight, and a special matinee will be given this afternoon at 2:30.
