## MISSOULA AHEAD OF KALISPELL

HAS MORE FLATHEAD FILINGS  
FROM LAST LIST OF  
ELIGIBLES.

With three days yet to go, Flathead land selections in Missoula have already exceeded Kalispell's record. The latter's record was 90 selections out of the last 3,000 names, while, with the closing of the land office yesterday, there had been 96 selections, and the list of 3,000 will not be exhausted until September 29. ## FORT AND BONNER BETTER SERVED

HOURLY SCHEDULE TO EACH  
PLACE BY ELECTRIC CARS  
THIS MORNING

This morning there will go into effect a new schedule on the car lines to Bonner and to Fort Missoula. The arrival of the new cars is responsible for the change and yesterday one of the new coaches was put in service. This will relieve the necessity of having a single car make both the Bonner and the fort runs. This morning at 6 o'clock one car will leave for Bonner and another for Fort Missoula. The runs to each place will be of 30 minutes each way. The cars will leave Missoula for both places on the hour and leave the fort and Bonner on the half-hour—from 6 o'clock in the morning until midnight. Other changes will be made in the city system by the addition of new cars within the next few days.

## SCHOOL CENSUS OF MISSOULA DISTRICT

After several days of checking over the lists of the census takers, Clerk M. R. Hardenburgh of the school board of district No. 1 (Missoula) had the figures totaled last night. The census gives the total number of children in the district as 4,632, classified as follows:

Between the ages of 6 and 8—Males 229, females 256; total 475.

Between the ages of 8 and 14—Males 591, females 612; total 1,203.

Between the ages of 14 and 16—Males 202, females 217; total 420.

Between the ages of 14 and 16—Males 446, females 313; total 759.

Number of children under 6 years of age, 1,171.

The Missoula Mercantile company will furnish the seats, desks and other furniture. This is provided the bonds are sold, and there is very little doubt that this will be done. There will be four of these schools on the Flathead reservation. Ravalli has one, making the fourth.
