

Washington, Jan. 1.—There is apprehension in Latin-American circles here that the hasty resignation of Frederico Boyd, minister of foreign affairs for Panama, may precipitate a crisis in that republic. The electoral contest between the conservative party, headed by President Arosemena, and the liberals under the lead of Bellosguard Porras, lately minister to Washington, is growing bitter and much ill-feeling has developed.

So far, there has been nothing to warrant intervention of the United States, but, as under the treaty between America and Panama, a constitutional form of government must be maintained in the republic, strong representations probably would be made to the leader of the faction if it should appear that any measures have been adopted which threaten to prevent a free and fair presidential election.
