EDITORIALS:

GIVE THE CONSUMER A CHANCE

At a meeting of the American Bar Association, held in Boston night before last Judge Elbert H. Gary, head of the Steel Trust, delivered an address which was couched in most pessimistic language. To the mind of the eminent (we were going to write jurist—but monopolist is the only function in which he achieved eminence) gentleman America is facing the most serious and drastic competition, the fiercest commercial rivalry the world has ever seen. Judge Gary painted everything in dark and dismal colors.

Why all these prophets of evil should arise is beyond the ken of ordinary mortals. Where they see the frightful shapes that assail their fears no one else can see.

According to Judge Gary, England, France and Germany are prepared to rush in and grab the very bread out of the mouths of the suffering American population. But he does not tell where and how they can do it. All three of those great nations are overburdened with the greatest debts of all time. Greatest whether taken in the mass sums or in per capita proportions. Their laboring population has suffered frightful inroads from death and dismemberment by war. Their capital is empaired very greatly. The laborers who have survived the war have become accustomed to a larger share in the aggregate value of production than ever before. The burden of taxation is far heavier than it has ever been. All these things are and will be burdens upon production through many years. Prices for commodities produced have got to be at a high level to enable the nations named to carry the burdens described. It is true the United States carries also a big load of similar burdens; but the load is not so great in the aggregate, nor when considered upon a per capita basis. With the great increase in wealth, in variety and extent of production, in efficiency and effectiveness of population, the United States is in far better situation than any or all the other nations. Then why should there be so much alarm?

All the people in the United States will have to do will be to go along and make provision for their own wants and necessities. The great natural resources of the country are just as available as in other years; and needs of war have brought into the reach of availability many resources that had been neglected. Just get the American people busy in drawing from their own abundant and widespread natural resources the raw materials and making them up into commodities for their own apparel, housing and subsistence, and every individual in all the broad land will be busy, business will be good, times easy and everybody happy.

The great trouble with such people as Judge Gary is that they can see things only from the standpoint of production. To them the end and all object of production is for the benefit of the producer, when the benefit of the consumer should be the end most in view. Consump-

tion is the object of production. Were the wants, necessities and desires of consumers given more attention, and production given more to looking at the other side of the proposition, the very loosening of the leash given consumption would redound to the benefit of the producer.

And in their haste to keep the consumer from having full advantage and benefit of production the producers and middlemen have let go to waste each year vast quantities of the raw materials that should have gone into consumption, giving cheaper living, reducing cost of production and making easier everything all around.

The Garys, the Rockefellers and that ilk should stand aside for a while and give the consumer a chance


