Deaf and Dumb in Japan.

A lady missionary at Yokohama, Japan, Miss Carrie B. Hagis, has expressed an appeal to the deaf and dumb of America, calling attention to the pitiable condition of this class of unfortunate in that Empire. No provision of any kind is made for them by the Japanese Government, and they are left to drift on a miserable existence in all the darkness and degradation of the worst type of paganism. They are regarded by the heathen as under the dominion of evil spirits and for this reason are feared and hated, but are subjected from childhood to old age to all manner of abuse and neglect. The fact that they are born into the world in a comparatively helpless condition seems to alienate from them all that parental love and sympathy of which they stand in special need. Their lives are made almost an insufferable burden. They are tempted by other children and are denied many privileges that are accorded to other members of families and communities.

Numerous cases are reported of the most inhuman and unnatural treatment on the part of parents and guardians. An incident is related of a father who, on being asked to allow his daughter to attend a mission school, replied: "She is a nuisance and a fool; it is impossible for her to learn." Deaf and dumb children are often deserted in the streets, and left to wander about almost naked, begging, food and shelter. Miss Hagis says: "There seems to be no place in the whole Empire of Japan where deaf mutes are welcome. Their parents can do little or nothing for them, and consequently wish to send them away from home; no one else is ready for love or money to care for or instruct them."

Several Japanese gentlemen have recently taken an interest in the erection of an asylum for the deaf and dumb and blind at Tokio, and have given largely toward that object. One other school besides this, a private one at Kioto is all the provision of any kind made for them in the Empire. There are, of course, very few persons in Japan competent to instruct the deaf and dumb.

Henry B. Payne, Senator elect from Ohio and prospective Democratic candidate for the Presidency, is 74, but still active in business and worth about \$4,000,000.

Benjamin F. Butler is 56, and has the appearance of being eager for a fight. He doesn't want to be President—unless he can be nominated and elected.

Samuel J. Tilden of old ticket fame, is a bachelor of 70, with cultivated tastes and plenty of money, but not very handsome, and says he has no desire to be President.

General Swann, the Judge Advocate General of the army and former close friend of Garfield, is pictured as a short stout man with a rustic air. He has dark hair and whiskers, a broad face, is careless in his dress, usually has a cigarette in his mouth, and is quiet and retiring in his manner.

Ex-Secretary Blaine is 60 years old, but still a handsome man and has the energy of a man of 40. His hair is white, but his eye is bright, and his step quick and firm.

Postmaster General Gresham is tall and strong, has dark hair and whiskers, is about 50, and genial in his manner. He is confessedly one of the strongest and most popular of the dark horses.

Senator Blount is 50 years old and has a stout frame as well as a gigantic mind. He appears cold and dignified in public, but is genial in company with friends.

A correspondent of the *Courier-Journal* writes as follows from the City of Mexico concerning the State of Mexico:
The State of Mexico has a population of 7,000,000, and is in Southern Central Mexico, near the City of Mexico, which, for political reasons, is in the Federal district. Life is too short for me to give you an extended description of this State, and, indeed, it is hardly necessary, as all foreign interest is centered right in the capital itself. I will say, however, that the area is 20,000 square kilometers, and that the crop average, \$9,000,000 annually; that the mining districts of Mineral del Oro, Tamasacatlan, Ixtapa del Oro, Tepic, Coahuila and Zacatecas produce annually \$500,000 worth of ore, and employ 1,500 miners.

There are three iron foundries, 24 distilleries, 2 breweries, 3 gas works, 1 salt factory, 1 tobacco factory, 2 glass works, 34 sugar mills, 5 oil mills and 56 flour mills, besides 3 factories and 3 woolen mills. The State is divided into fifteen counties, and contains 5 cities, 31 towns, 603 villages, 390 estates, and 567 farms, the taxable property being in total \$22,508,980. There are 887 boys' schools and 181 for girls, educating 52,000 children; there are also 250 students at the literary institute.

Telegraph and telephone communication is in good shape, and the Postoffice Department has distributing offices at Chicon, Guanajuato, Jilotepec, Toluca, Toluca and Texcoco, American, writing to relatives or friends in Mexico should pay particular attention to the address, and in every case should indicate the point of entry into Mexico, for example, "via El Paso," or whatever route is most desirable.
