Joseph Brennan, the Irish Poet.
From the "New Orleans Playmate."
How sweetly and it is to gaze upon some pure and babbling brook whose stream becomes abruptly a roaring torrent, which leaps from rock to rock into golden sand and flowers winds its way into an resting place where its gathered waters expand into a lake whose silvery bosom nature mirrors the varied beauties of its margin. And mournful is it to behold the favored child of poetry, who soaring on the wings of inspired song has found a dwelling place in lofty regions and in mystic words created by his own thoughts, fall from those Empyrean heights in his radiant youth, to be consigned to the sepulchre of mortal clay! Thus does the mighty oak, riven by lightning and uprooted by blast, come crashing to the earth, and so the gallant ship, victor of many a storm, founders at last and sinks in mid ocean, with all its streamers flying in the wind.
In such images, at once, of beauty and of horror, may be sketched the brief existence of the loved and lost poet Joseph Brennan.

He was a native of Cork, Ireland, having come into this world in 1823. He acquired a superior classical education at the University of Dublin, which he improved upon careful study and industrious reading.
Endowed with the fatal gift of genius, he, like his friend and companion, the heroic bard Thomas Davis, unrolled the "green banner," and struck his harp with a hot hand and patriot soul.
He was an active member of the Young Ireland party in the revolution of 1849. After there was no longer any hope for success, he fled to New York and wrote for the "Citizen," then conducted by the celebrated Irish patriot, John Mitchell.
Brennan was a poet, orator, journalist, wit, and man of rare literary attainments.

He subsequently moved to this city, and became one of the editors of the New Orleans Delta. He was chiefly famed as a brilliant poet and vigorous political writer. His style was pungent and lucid, always exact, often eloquent and humorous.
Brennan had a dauntless, generous nature, as free from the alloy of the world as was ever mortal. Truth, bravery, devotion and charity were always with him.
The writer of this brief sketch remembers with emotion the "attie nights," in which Laurant J. Signer, Brennan, Alexander Walker, John S. Thrasher, and other talented journalists engaged in controversy upon some political issue or literary topic, in the editorial room of the Delta, and Brennan poured forth in burning words the golden treasures of the radiant genius.

The unfortunate poet died in May, 1857, after having bravely battled for life, not for himself, but others. At twenty-eight years of age he was borne to his grave. A marble slab marks the humble spot where he sleeps, in a shady corner of the old St. Louis Cemetery in this city.
It is to be regretted that the poems of Brennan, with a memoir of his life, in two parts; the first, "Brennan in Ireland," by Dr. R. D'Alton Williams; and the second, "Brennan in America," by Walter Hopkins, both distinguished writers, have never been published. On his deathbed, Brennan expressed upon the minds of his friends the wish that his numerous poems might be collected together and published in the form named above, the proceeds of the sale to be given to his widow and children. The gentlemen chosen by him accepted the trust confided to them, but shortly after followed him to "that bourne from whence no traveler returns."
Brennan's songs strike the reader for their deep, great passion, emanating from a throbbing heart, and for their many beauties of rhyme and simile.

His beautiful poems, "Thanatos," "Light," "Albion," "Chant for Russia," a "Dirge for Devin Reilly," and others of great merit, are too long for quotation.
The exquisite stanzas "To my wife," which reveal the author's genius, have ere this been published; but invariably in an innocent version. The following is strictly accurate:
Come to me, darling, I'm lonely without thee.
Day time and night time I'm dreaming about thee;
Night time and day time in dreams I hold thee fast;
I've done the waking which ceases to fold thee.
Come to me, darling, my sorrows to lighten;
Come in thy beauty to bless and to brighten;
Come in thy womanhood, lonely and lowly;
Come in thy loveliness, openly and boldly.

Swallow shall fit round the desolate ruin,
Telling of spring and its joys renewing.
And thoughts of thy love and its manifold treasure,
Are circling my heart with a gleaming of pleasure.
Oh! Spring of my spirit, oh! Day of my life,
Shine out on my soul till it burgeon and bloom!
The waste of my life has a rose root within it,
And thy fondness alone to the sunshine can win it.

Figure which moves like a song through the even,
Features fit up with a reflex of heaven.
Eyes like the skies of poor Erin, our mother,
Where sun and shadow are chasing each other
Smiles coming seldom, but child-like and simple,
And opening their eyes from the heart of a simple;
Oh! thanks to the saviour that even by seeming
Is left to the exile to brighten his dreaming.

You have been glad when you knew I was glad;
Dear, are you not now to hear an admission?
Our hearts ever answer in time and in tune, love,
As octave to octave, or rhyme unto rhyme, love;
I cannot smile, but your cheeks will be glowing;
You cannot weep, but my tears will be flowing;
You will not linger when I shall have died, love,
And I could not live without you by my side, love.

Come to me, darling, ere I die of my sorrow,
Rise on my gloom like the sun of myorrow,
Strong, sweet and kind as the words which I speak,
Love,
With a song at your lip, and a smile on your cheek,
Love;
Come, for my heart in your absence is dreary;
Haste, for my spirit is sickened and weary;
Come to the arms which alone shall care thee;
Come to the heart which is throbbing to press thee.

After the death of the poet, Mrs. Brennan resided for some time in Brooklyn, New York, where she died a few years ago, leaving two children, Florence and George, heirs to their father's fame.
It is believed that most of Brennan's manuscripts are in the possession of his gifted brother-in-law, Mr. John Savage, now connected with the New York Press.

THE PRESIDENT'S PEACE.—The blood stained streets of the metropolis of the South are the answering comment to Gen. Grant's boast that peace had been established by him in every Southern State. Cannon roaring at their doors, cavalry raiding through their thoroughfares, and all the preparations of war in the calm of peace, these are the attestations the people of New Orleans have of Gen. Grant's peace. It is a scene such as no American city should witness in this generation. The Governor of the State, attempting his lawful office, is met by the forces of a fraudulent government and the threatening presence of the United States troops. The police, armed with artillery, ruthlessly open fire on the streets, sending grape and canister hurtling among the inoffensive citizens.—[Indianapolis Sentinel.]
