Letter from John Henry Brown.

AUSTIN, March 26, 1873.

To the Honorable Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Dallas:

GENTLEMEN—Though receiving no official notice of the fact, I see by the Dallas HERALD of the 23d inst., that your honorable body has passed some sort of censure on me in relation to the amended city charter.

Now, I make the following proposition to you:

First—Call a private meeting of the people of the city of Dallas, let Mayor Long preside, assisted by a citizen as Vice President and another as Secretary.

Second—Let the charter all be first read. Then read the charter section by section, and let the people adopt or amend it to suit themselves.

Have each amendment carefully drawn by a competent person or committee, and, when so arranged, let the amendments so desired by the people be sent to me as soon as possible, and I will get them passed by the Legislature.

Here, gentlemen, is a plain and fair proposition to ascertain and carry out the will of the people, whose will I shall always obey, or resign my seat.

The pretense that I desired to legislate men out of office is ridiculous, when you consider that I continued the present Mayor and Board in office till April, 1874, four months longer than they were elected for.

I have no doubt but the act has various defects, which time will reveal; but they can be corrected at any time by the Legislature.

If the people want to be taxed one per cent, let them say so, and I will carry out their will with pleasure. But as we were elected under a solemn pledge to do all we could to reform bad laws and reduce the burthens of taxation on the people, for one, I have labored day and night to serve and save the people who elected me.

We have to work under great difficulties, because a majority of the Senate and the Governor have a voice in all we do. The House is overwhelmingly in favor of all sound relief and reform; but the House is only one of three parties in enacting laws.

In conclusion, I have this to say, to wit: office has no charms for me, and whenever the people of the District, or even of Dallas county, become dissatisfied with my acts, I will gladly resign and go to my

family, where peace, confidence and love have reigned for nearly thirty years.

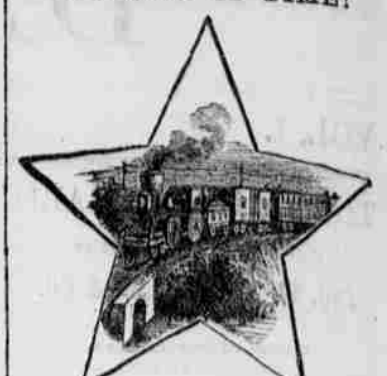
