THE RELIGIOUS WORLD.

We clip the following items from the Texas Baptist Herald:—The church at Tyler is still without a pastor.

—The churches west of San Antonio are doing well. —Dr. Pritchard lately held an interesting protracted meeting in Raleigh, N. C.

—The First Baptist church, Houston, on last Sunday received three by letter and two for baptism. —Rev. L. B. Fish writes to the Standard that the Baptists are the only denomination prospering in Kentucky.

—The Virginia Memorial Fund has a place in the hearts of the Baptists of that State and elsewhere. —The Methodists of Tennessee have determined to raise \$1,000,000 to found a University, the location of which will probably be the city of Nashville.

—The Watchman and Reflector states that of eighty-four Baptist missionaries sent from this country to Asia since July, 1855, only three have died, and only ten have returned. Of this number, seventeen labored in China, eight among the Telougos, eight in Assam, and forty-six in Burmah. Of these forty-six not one has died in seventeen years.

—Bishop Haven organized the first Methodist Episcopal church in Mexico, January 26th, consisting of Rev. Dr. Ignacio Ramirez, long a Dominican priest, and three others. During the following week he engaged the chapel of the Convent of the Professa, and opened it with a union service on the first Sabbath in February. He has also secured the nucleus of a Methodist church in Pachua, the centre of the silver-mining district. [N. O. Advocate.]

Dr. A. S. Lipscomb, of Montgomery county, died at his residence in Grimes county April 8th. He is well known as a high-toned christian and gentleman. He will be greatly missed from his church at Montgomery. Says a friend in writing, "he died as he had lived, quiet, calm, and confiding in Jesus."

General Gordon. The Atlanta Sun of April 1, contains the following editorial by Alex. H. Stephens on Vice-President Wilson's compliment to General Gordon:

The courteous compliment paid Gen. Gordon by Vice President Wilson the other day in calling this distinguished ex-Confederate Chief to preside over the Senate, is extensively noted and variously commented on by the press in all parts of the country. The impression seems to be entertained by many that this is the first honor of the kind bestowed upon ex-Confederates in Congress.

This is a mistake, if our memory be not at fault. It is but a repetition in the Senate of the like honor conferred on Gen. DuBoise by Mr. Speaker Blaine, soon after this gallant ex-Confederate officer took his seat in the House as the Representative of the Eighth district in Georgia. The moral of all such compliments should be to cause all ex-Confederates of every grade and class, to cling closer to the glorious principles of self-government, for which they contended in the day of fratricidal strife, and which principles lie at the foundation of all our free institutions.

These courtesies are but indications of those higher honors which are in store for ex-Confederates in days to come who shall prove true to themselves and steadfastly adhere to the vital principles of all American constitutional liberty. With patience, virtue, intelligence and patriotism on the part of the Southern people, the day is not distant when their "leaders" in the late "rebellion," so called in the language of Andy Johnson, will no longer be "branded" with the dishonorable name of "traitors," but denoted in history in the rank of self-sacrificing patriots, "consecrated to the admiration of the world, and placed by the side of Washington, Hampden and Sydney."

It was, indeed, a proud day for General Gordon, and a proud day for Georgia, and a proud day for all the Southern States, when the "leader" in the late hopeless charge in behalf of their cause in the field was (instead of being "branded as a traitor") called upon to preside over the ambassadors of all the States in Senate assembled.
