

was one man, who by a series of villainies, deprived her of the means of livelihood for herself and children, three of whom are now helpless, and unprotected. She endeavored to recover by the law, but she fell into the hands of persons in that profession who made her opinions of men still worse. The excess and variety of her misfortunes were greater than she could bear; and her senses were lost amidst the accumulated miseries by which she was surrounded. A good humored levity succeeded to the tears which used to flow at the prospect of her children's ruined expectations; and from that moment she became possessed of a sort of happiness which was only interrupted by the schemes and terrors of a wild imagination. She frequented the Courts of Law, and upon one occasion looked at the twelve Judges in the Exchequer Chamber, where they were deliberating upon a question of life and death. This extraordinary act she performed for the purpose, she said, of keeping justice under lock and key, "that the thousands might find it at last, and be supplied with it for nothing. So on after it occurred to her, that her own case demanded some of the powerful interference of her learned prisoners, but on going back she found that even they had violated the principles which they were bound to protect by breaking prison, and that they had left not an atom of justice behind them except their wigs. She had amongst other strange fancies supposed that every place of which she obtained possession of the keys became from that moment her own property, and had determined to leave them as an inheritance to her relatives. She was to be seen at all places of public resort. Her powers of memory are great. A number of keys were not ticked. Upon one occasion she was confined from what particular rooms in houses she had taken them from, and at what time. She was fond of getting hold of the keys of a lady's dressing room or trunk, with the view of preventing the owner, to whom nature had given one face, from making hers if another. Upon one occasion she stole the keys of Horse-changer-lane Gaol, and caused the most extraordinary sensation amongst those who were most interested, for it was generally supposed that another Jack Shepherd was in the prison, and all the ingenuity of the keepers was set to work to prevent an attempt to escape. Notwithstanding her frequent attentions to this system of plunder, she was never known to neglect her children. In superintending their education she seemed to have recovered the use of her reason, but she performed the duties of a mistress with great ability, and with a power of discrimination which it would be well to see imitated.

The Lord Mayor said, the poor creature must not be set at large. Her unfortunate propensity was likely to cause much mischief. Servants were liable to be suspected, and those who were deprived of the keys were put to great expense in supplying their losses, as well as put to serious apprehensions that the keys were taken for felonious purposes. She was remanded for a week, that some provision may be made for her, and a security provided to prevent any more frantic depredations. She was committed.
