ROUTE.

The procession will form in line at the position indicated at 9:30 o'clock a. m. The head of the procession will move up Camp to Chartres, up Chartres to Canal, down Canal to Magazine, down Magazine to Julia, down Julia to St. Charles, down St. Charles to Canal, down Canal to Rampart, down Rampart to port side of Esplanade, up Esplanade to Royal, down Royal to Mandeville, up Mandeville to levee, up Levee to south side of Esplanade, down Esplanade to Royal, up Royal to Canal, where the procession will be dismissed.

The Chief Engineer and Assistants will be stationed at the fountain, corner Camp and Canal streets. As the companies arrive upon the ground they will promptly report through their Marshals to the Assistant Engineers, who will indicate their position. As soon as the Assistant Engineers have formed their respective divisions they will report to the Chief Engineer, which being done, the Chief and Assistants will report to a bell to the Grand Marshal.

The formation being complete, the Chief Engineer will direct twelve taps to be struck upon all the bells connected with the alarm telegraph, as a signal that the procession has moved.

The Marshals and Foremen of the various companies are notified to be punctually on the ground, as the procession will positively move at 10 o'clock.

Whenever a break occurs in the procession the marshal of the company at the point where the break has taken place will at once communicate the fact to the marshal preceding him, who in like manner will pass on the information to the Grand Marshal. As soon as the line is again closed the fact will be at once distributed in the same manner to the head of the procession.

The Aids to the Grand Marshal will report to him at 10 o'clock a. m. at the corner of Canal and Dryades streets. In the event that the weather prevents the procession from taking place it will be indicated by fifteen taps on the alarm bells, repeated three times. The procession will then stand postponed.

Whenever the procession is halted along the line of march, the companies are requested to avoid the sidewalks as much as possible, so as not to interrupt the running of the cars.

TO CITY TAXPAYERS OF 1880.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE, CITY HALL, New Orleans, January 31, 1880.

ALL PERSONS OWING CITY TAXES FOR 1879, are hereby notified that the city will receive ten mills on account of the tax of fifteen mills levied for that year, and will give credit for such partial payments on the tax bills drawn the same two-thirds in full, and retaining same. If the courts shall decide that only one per cent is all that can be demanded, the balance of the tax bill will be delivered to the taxpayers as receipts in full. If they decide that the levy of 15 per cent is valid, the remaining balance of 14 per cent will be demanded with interest thereon from March 1, 1880. No receipts for partial payments of taxes under this notice shall be considered as a waiver of any of the rights of the city to proceed for the remainder. All good citizens who desire to see the expenses of the municipal government paid, including the school teachers, police, fire, etc., are requested to come forward and pay their taxes in full or on account under this notice. This system of collection will begin on and after THURSDAY, the fifth instant.

For those who pay the fifteen-mill rate, the following rates of cash rebate will be allowed, viz: Until the fifteenth of February 6 per cent. From the fifteenth of February to the twenty-ninth, inclusive 3 per cent. From the first of March to the thirty-first of March, 2 per cent.

ALL PERSONS OWING CITY TAXES FOR 1879, are hereby notified that the city will receive ten mills on account of the tax of fifteen mills levied for that year, and will give credit for such partial payments on the tax bills drawn the same two-thirds in full, and retaining same. If the courts shall decide that only one per cent is all that can be demanded, the balance of the tax bill will be delivered to the taxpayers as receipts in full. If they decide that the levy of 15 per cent is valid, the remaining balance of 14 per cent will be demanded with interest thereon from March 1, 1880. No receipts for partial payments of taxes under this notice shall be considered as a waiver of any of the rights of the city to proceed for the remainder. All good citizens who desire to see the expenses of the municipal government paid, including the school teachers, police, fire, etc., are requested to come forward and pay their taxes in full or on account under this notice.
