## OUR RUE DE LA PAIX.

It Is Lower Broadway, With  
Quick-Eat Clubs and  
Buffets.

NE of the interesting features of  
Parisian life is the aspect of the  
Rue de la Paix at lunch time.  
The broad thoroughfare and the beautiful  
Place Vendôme are deserted by shop-  
pers; there are no more little clusters  
and eager groups gazing through the  
glass of the jewellers' shops; you see  
no richly attired ladies alighting from  
their carriage or their motor cars. Now  
and then a humble hack passes, trot-  
ting quietly. The day at that time be-  
long to the midnettes.

The midnettes, shop girls, go by in  
little bands, bareheaded, always laugh-  
ing. They trip rapidly and happily to  
some "cromerie," where they munch a  
roll or two, sip a glass of milk, eat  
some sweets, and out they go again to  
work. They do not earn very much,  
and they are splendidly economical;  
these little artists whose small fingers  
make the wonderful costumes seen on  
the Champs Elysees.

And here on your Fifth Avenue I have  
seen also midnettes, girls who work  
in stores and shops, artists with the  
needle or with the typewriter and pen,  
nimble-fingered, quick-witted. In Paris  
they have a little different style, a sim-  
ple chic of their own, with their short  
black skirts, their hair prettily ar-  
ranged and their charming mocking  
airs.

### Here It Is the Shop Girl.

Though in New York there are no  
little midnettes just like the French,  
there are at least the stenographers and  
shop girls one sees on lower Broadway.  
They are just as much a feature of  
that broad lane as are the midnettes of  
the Rue de la Paix. But they are  
not so young, not so much like child-  
ren. They have grown-up airs and a  
consciousness of their own importance.  
Some of them, I hear, draw very large  
salaries, some very small. However, it  
may be they all seem to earn enough  
to give them independence.

You seldom see them in groups. They  
do not meet on the streets and move  
along in gay little bands, or walk  
quietly arm in arm. The crush on  
Broadway forbids this grouping and  
quiet walking. Nor are they bare-  
headed. Instead, their fluffy hair is  
covered by elaborate hats. The little  
feet are at ease in elegant boots. They  
dress well, and most of them are pretty.  
They are certainly the best type of  
American girls. They have pluck and  
a natural grand air.

They walk with such ease and inde-  
pendence that they make their way  
through the pushing crowd of men  
nicely. Then they work with and  
among men, which, I suppose, gives  
them that confident, always assured  
air.

### Not Spoiled by Daily Toil.

Everywhere they go they are con-  
scious of their value, of their rights,  
and they are not afraid of men toward  
them. They have none of the sad ex-  
pression one would expect to find in  
women working all day at a desk. Their  
manly work and yet their manly  
ways have not spoiled them.  
While the men eat rapidly, "have a  
bite standing" at the buffet or seated  
on high stools, the girls eat quietly  
and daintily at tables. Some go to clubs  
they have organized.  
It is quite amazing to see in  
lower Broadway, the greatest business  
quarter of the world, so many beau-  
tiful women in such superb gowns and  
charming hats. Perhaps you go to see  
somebody on business, and on entering  
his office you see on the race one or  
more wonderful feathered hats. You  
think that you are mistaken, that you  
have stumbled into the wrong place. A  
glance at the man's face, however, at all  
things is just as proper as it  
should be. They are the creations of  
the working girls. It is astonishing,  
but it is well that it is as it is.

## POLICEMAN HURT IN BURGLAR HUNT

Dalton Falls Into Areaway

Burglar Alarm.

waiting patiently in his well-like prison.  
He was lifted out and taken to Gouver-  
neur Hospital, where the doctors found  
his leg badly mangled and bruised.

eurs Are Fined.

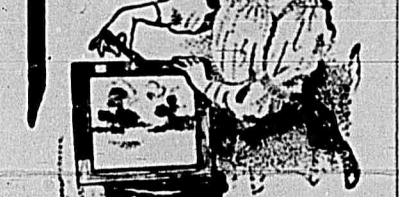
Six young Englishmen, guests at the

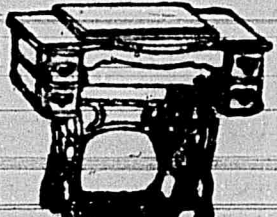

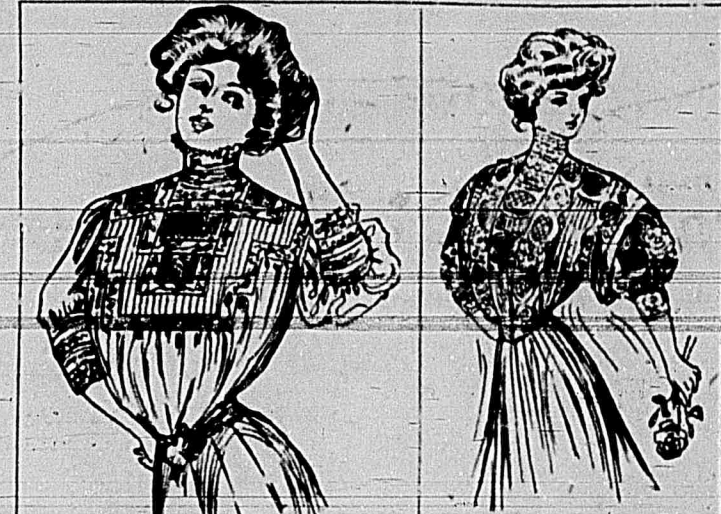

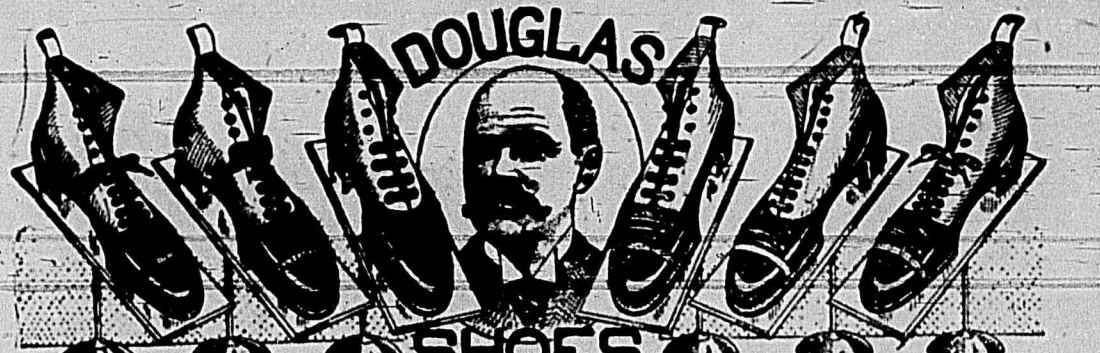
