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ANGLERS INVITE "PROS."

Will Urge the Conservation of Finny Tribe.

The United Anglers' League has for years advocated and striven for conservation of fish and fisheries. The main difficulty encountered has been to make commercial fishermen see that they, equally with sportsmen, are vitally interested.

Among the aims of the league is to extend the jurisdiction of the State Conservation Commission over the three-mile limit with a view to adequate protection of marine species and the establishment of marine hatcheries on the Long Island shore. That commercial fishermen are at last wakening to the fact that their real interests lie in that direction is shown by recent co-operation of lobster fishermen in New England with the authorities in protecting the fishery by which they make their living.

At the league meeting to-night in the Fulton building, several boat captains are expected to be present. Commercial fishermen also will be welcome. Col. William K. Simmons will talk on bluefish.
