We trust every New-York reader at least will peruse attentively the ADDRESS OF THE WHIG MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE to their constituents, which will be found on the first page of this paper.

It is understood that at a Congressional Caucus held in Washington on Saturday evening, Hon. JOHN WILTZ of Kentucky, was selected as the Whig candidate for Speaker of the House, and Hon. FRANCIS O. J. SMITH of Maine, for Clerk. They were of course elected yesterday.

THE CASE OF GLENTWORTH.—James B. Glentworth has been fairly and fully tried before a jury of his countrymen, but no verdict obtained. It was evident enough, if any reliance whatever can be placed on the story of Stevenson, that Glentworth had been guilty of rascality, but what did not so clearly appear.

The Fire at the National Theatre.—The investigations into the authorship of the fire that consumed the National Theatre, is still progressing before the Police Magistrates, and some additional facts have been elicited that tend to strong suspicions that some others of higher pretensions than these now under arrest, were indirectly at least concerned in or privy to the conflagration.

Incendiarism.—A portion of the employees on the works of the Croton Aqueduct, it is known, have for a long time been in a state of rebellion against law, and have perpetrated a series of such audacious outrages that the arm of the civil power has been repeatedly raised to their aid.

Sudden Death.—On Tuesday the 23th ult. a man named Lewis was drowned at Pottsville, Pa. while working in one of the iron mines. It appears that he was working upward toward another vein which had been sunk to some depth from the surface.

A Dreadful Suicide.—A man committed suicide at the Alms House, in Roxbury, Mass., on Monday the 24th, by running a broom-stick down his throat ten inches, and died shortly afterward from its effects. He was a foreigner, and partially deranged.

Naval mode of Fishing.—At Tonawanda they have a novel and easy method of catching Bass. All that is necessary is to paddle a canoe in the evening near the shore of a stream, keeping the canoe inclined as much as possible towards the shore, without dipping; the fish seeing the shadow of the boat, make a rush to jump over it, and fall into the canoe.

CORONER'S OFFICE.—Investigation.—In consequence of various reports that another person was killed at the fire in the National Theatre, or in the house of Julia Brown, 55 Leonard street, other than Margaret Yager, and that a gentleman had broken his leg by jumping out of a window, and also that a girl had been carried to the hospital in a dangerous state, by jumping out of an upper window of that house, the Coroner and Attorney Parker summoned Julia Brown and the late inmates of that house before them yesterday afternoon at the Coroner's Office, to testify to all the facts that were known to them touching the subject of inquiry.

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At a State Convention of the Abolitionists held at Montpelier Vt., on the 26th ult., the following nominations were made for State officers: for Governor, Hon. Charles K. Williams; for Lieut. Governor, Paul Dillingham, Jr.; for Treasurer, Hon. Henry F. Jones.

The Intelligencer says there would be a full attendance in the House of Representatives yesterday at the opening of Congress, but it was somewhat doubtful whether a quorum of the Senate would be present.

The Chevalier GASPARD JOSE LISBOA, Minister Resident of His Majesty the Emperor of Brazil, arrived at Washington Friday evening, and on Saturday was presented, by the Secretary of State, to the President, to whom the new Minister delivered his letter of credence.

The Railroad train from Philadelphia came through last evening in five hours—the quickest trip ever yet made. It came in just after 10 o'clock.
