Purchase cheaply and sell dearly is the ad vice of Adam Smith, and there is no doubt at all that this is a very good way to become rich; bu even the best advice is not worth much provided you have no means of following it. Our philosopher seems to have forgotten that his advice be longs to two different persons-one half to the purchaser and the other to the seller: now if both should adopt it, the purchaser determining not to buy unless he could buy cheap, and the seller that he would not sell except for a large price, it is obvious a bargain would be impossible. Similar adwho wished to become happy. Nothing is easier. said our Creesus, 'you need only a million of dol-True,' said the poor man, ' but hitherto with my utmost endeavors I have not been able to ret even ten 'Since bearing this I have been among the merchants so many who advise their competitors and rivals to get the highest and pay the lowest price-while they themselves make haste to bring their bargains to a close on much

In my opinion, on this subject Adam Smith identifies the great body of the People, the mas Merchants. As to these latter, his advice may be apparently true-for they only buy to sell again and sell to buy again: and they do both for gain and profit, which can only result by getting much and giving little. But the matter is otherwise with the great bulk of the People. They purchase not for others, but to supply their own wants; and what they buy, they themselves consume: what they sell, they part with not for mere gainful traffic, but to get rid of a surplus: both selling and purchasing are with them necessary acts: and how could they be done if Mr. Adam Smith's advice were followed! If a People in undertaking this come into competition with others, must they not be repulsed from the markets every where? They would struggle in vain to find either buyers or sellers, while a nation that could sell cheaply and pay well would overwhelm its rivals and monopolize the market. Happy, therefore, is that nation that is rich enough to do this-but happier is that other nation that need neither buy nor sell abroadbut finds an ample market at home; and to attain this happiness is easy, if we only adopt a wise Protective Policy.

A SEA-VOYAGE .- About as many blunders are committed in attempting the use of terms at sea. as in any other business of which we have any knowledge. The vocabulary of the sailor is a difficult one to become acquainted with, and to the old Salt nothing is more ludicrous than the perversions of phrase common to the land-lubbor on hip-board or on shore.
