WASHINGTON, June 16, 1842. The provisional tariff was read twice in the Senate today, and referred to the Committee on Finance...

As was expected, the Senate have stricken out of the Navy Appropriation bill the proviso of the House, and through Mr. Evans, the Chairman of the Committee of Finance, have moved an additional sum of \$450,000 for the service during the year...

The House reconsidered its vote of yesterday (insisting on the ratio of 30,000, and the subject is again open for re-arranging any number that may be proposed...

The bill from the House to extend to the 1st of August the existing revenue laws, Mr. Lyvass moved to refer to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. BUCHANAN expressed himself in favor of the reference, and in opposition to the bill, were the proviso (relating to distribution) retained.

Mr. KISS expressed his decided hostility to the bill, involving a breach of the solemn obligation, made to the country in the passage of the Distribution Bill, that the Compromise Act should not be interfered with.

The bill from the House to strike up and amend the amendment of the Committee to strike out the proviso of the House, (which had been amended so as to limit the number of officers and seamen to that now in service) was adopted.

Mr. PRESTON moved an additional section, appropriating \$200,000, or as much of that sum as necessary, for the transportation, arrangement and possession of the articles brought by the Exploring Expedition.

Without a further question the Senate adjourned. Resolutions of the Legislature of Pennsylvania for the speedy passage of the Appropriation bill were presented in both Houses.

In the House, the resolution reported some days since by Mr. STANLEY instructing the Committee on Public Expenditures to inquire into the character of the claims for Virginia bounty land-warrants, was debated during the morning hour.

Mr. FILLMORE laid before the House a memorial statement, prepared under the direction of the Committee of Ways and Means, of the tariff of this country from 1816 down to the present time, arranged according to the sections of the revenue bill under consideration, and showing the various rates of duties proposed by the bills reported from the Committees of Ways and Means and Manufacture, and by the Secretary of the Treasury, the amount of importations in 1840, with the foreign cost thereof.

Mr. F. moved the printing of the usual number of Copies. The rules were suspended to receive a motion, to print 5,000 extra copies. Mr. W. C. Johnson moved the printing of a supplement showing the final vote, by Yeas and Nays, of both Houses on each of the previous tariff acts passed by Congress, to be arranged by the States.

After a long and tumultuous wrangle on matters of order, Mr. BOWEN moved to lay the motion and amendment on the table, and called for the reading of the document, (which would consume something less than a week.) The clerk commenced the reading but soon suspended, Mr. B. withdrawing the motion by his demand for it.

The amendment of Mr. JOHNSON prevailed, and the main question to print was carried, Yeas 113, Nays 36. Mr. COOPER of Ga., moved to reconsider the vote on the printing, and after a speech of about an hour, the motion was laid on the table, and thus the subject disposed of, after occupying over two hours.

Mr. J. B. INGERSOLL, from the Committee of Ways and Means, reported a bill legalizing and making appropriations for such necessary objects as have usually been included in the general appropriation bills, without other authority of law.

The Appropriation Bill was again taken up, and Mr. DAVIS of Ky., moved a reconsideration of the vote of yesterday insisting on the disagreement to the amendments of the Senate (changing the ratio to 70,000, and providing for the representation of fractions.)

After a session of some length, principally a repetition of previous arguments, which Messrs. Everett, Tillinghast, Hunt, and Gordon participated in, the motion to reconsider prevailed.—Yeas 101, Nays 87; and the question occurring on the motion to insist on the disagreement.

HORRIBLE MURDER BY NEGROES.—The Natchez Free Trader contains an account of one of the most horrible series of outrageous murders on record, committed by two negroes named Joseph and Enoch, owned by two men on Bayou de Glauze...

One of the murderers was caught, on the 5th instant, near Union Point, on the Mississippi, the other making his escape, though not without having had several bolts fired at him, and is supposed to have been wounded; though not caught, it is to be hoped that he will soon be brought to pay the penalty of his atrocious crimes.

They then killed another man, whose name is not known. After committing this murder, on returning to the place where Miss H. was confined, they remarked that they had killed another hog. After this they went to the house of Mr. George Todd, not far from Mr. H., whom they also killed, carrying off Mrs. Todd with a small child, whom they treated also in a most brutal manner, and threatening to kill both her and the child if it should cry; and often when they were on the point of killing them all, the yellow girl would throw herself on her knees and beg their lives, saying that if they shot them, their bullets would have to pass through her body.
