So, then, we can truly declare that the Filipino revolution does not reach out for national independence for its final goal. It is only a medium through which to obtain the enjoyment of the immense blessing born of liberty. Consequently, if the revolution cannot secure the enjoyment of this liberty the war ought to cease.

Liberty, gentlemen, suarantees progress, and progress is the continual social evolution in life. Consequently the progress of the people, of the Filipino people, is a certainty and is providential. No human power can hold back the march of this law which permeates nature. Look at those great peoples who to-day march at the head of the cultured nations of Europe. Look at the great nation of North America, which in the past was shrouded in obscurity, and to-day is the model- of greatness in the task of liberating enslaved peoples. Let us be patient, and we will see that the sun which has lightened others who were in darkness, this same sun, lightens us to-day and will not cease to dispel our darkness in the future. I have said that the progress of nations is providential; this we may see for ourselves in what is taking place in our own country. The invasion of our predecessors when the then powerful Spain planted in our country her sovereignty, and with it her laws, her customs, her religion and her ideals. For more than three centuries the lot of our people was in her hands, and during that time the general mass of people have learned but two ideas—that of the servant who obeys, on the one hand, and that of the master who commands, on the other.
