

GIANTS WIN IN TENTH

Matty, with a Single, Drives in the Run That Counts.

MERKLE SLAMS THE BALL

Four Hits Open the Way to All the Tallies Made by New York.

Matty won his own game with Philadelphia at the Polo Grounds yesterday afternoon, in the tenth inning. He sent Merkle racing home with the winning run by driving out a single after the Phillies had bunched four hits on the big pitcher at the ninth and tied up the contest with two runs. The final score was 3 to 2, and all the runs tallied by the Giants fell to Merkle, who made two singles and two doubles. The final act was neatly and simply staged. Merkle got his fourth hit upon opening the inning, and Meyers, instead of trying to single for the third time, laid down a neat sacrifice to first. Matty then came to the front with a stinging grounder through short, which brought Merkle home, and the game was over.

Rare indeed are the occasions when a single and a double sent a batter safely to the Giants with Mathewson in the box, but the Phillies treated "Big Six" Rayner severely in that ninth frame. In the course of the game they collected nine hits off his delivery, but these tallied only two runs; nevertheless, the liberty which they took with Matty's curves amounted almost to sacrifice. Five singles, interlarded with plenty of outs, made the first eight innings, were not at all dangerous, but trouble was in store.

When the ninth rolled around it looked for a while as though Matty was going to give an imitation of "Bugs" Raymond. First he hit Magee with a pitched ball, then Ward planted an easy grounder at Doyle in time to allow the latter to head off Magee on his way to second. The run hit back to first, with Doyle after him, but Larry had his wits about him and threw to Merkle in time to put out Ward, who was racing toward the bag. In the mean time Magee started for second once more, with Merkle after him, but was out when Bridwell received the ball. A rumpus with the umpire followed, and Magee was sent the field to join Grant, who had received a three days' suspension for his action on Tuesday.

It was fortunate that this double play had cleared the bags, as Doolan doubled to right and went to third on Moran's single to left. Bransfield went in as a pinch hitter and singled, scoring Doolan. While Thomas planted a grounder through short, which brought Moran home with the tying run. Knabe then forced out Thomas at second with a grounder to Bridwell.

Stack, the unbeaten pitcher whom the Phillies secured from the Chicago Cubs, appeared in the box for the visitors. The Giants had a little trouble with him, to say the least, and it had not been for a combination which Merkle and Meyers presented and the "Indian sign" they apparently had on the youth things might have been different.

The home nine went out practically in order for the first four innings. Merkle's unbolstered single being the only hit to relieve the monotony. With one out in the fifth, however, Merkle delivered a sharp grounder over third base which went for a double. Meyers hit the first ball pitched to left field for a single, and Merkle singled. Again, in the seventh, with one out, Merkle doubled to left; this time lifting the ball just above Walsh's head, and again Meyers singled, bringing him home with the second run.

The latter threw to Knight, forcing Milan, and Knight shot the ball to Chase, who with one of his brilliant one-handed stops pulled the ball down for the second out. Gardner played a wonderful game in the field, accepting nine chances without an error. Knight had an error chalked up against him, but displayed good form otherwise.

The latter was out at third in trying to stretch the hit, but Warhop, who was in the box, hit Gray for a single. Then Warhop opened with a single, and although Hemphill and Walter fled out, Chase came to the rescue with a safe drive, which sent the Yankees to the winning run.
