

## ARMENIANS TALK OF STRIKE AGAINST GOD

Friends of Martougeyan Demand Return of Ex-Convict's Priestly Office.

### UNFROCKED PRIEST SPEAKS

Blames Foes in Turkey for His Downfall After the Tavshan-jian Murder Three Years Ago.

After two and a half years in Sing Sing, Father Martougeyan, the Armenian priest, is at liberty. But all the while that the man who was suspected in the Hunchakist troubles of three years ago which culminated in the Tavshanjian murder has been at work in the prison wearing pockets and button holes in waistcoats, his friends and sympathizers have been waiting for him to be "sprung," as they say up at Police Headquarters. Now that he is free again, many of them took occasion last night to indorse him with a set of resolutions and to denounce the people that they believed sent him up the river.

The black haired priest has plenty of staunch adherents and hundreds of brothers and because of this the "strike against God," as some of the Armenians call it, will soon be instituted in New York. There are now in New England, according to Father Martougeyan, five hundred Armenian children whose parents will allow no one to baptize them but himself. Neither will these fathers and mothers go to church except to hear Martougeyan speak. It is from his tongue and only his, he says, they wish to hear the Word of God. But he is an unfrocked priest, for three years ago Archbishop Saradjan received word from Mekertich Kherimian that Martougeyan, on his demand, had been degraded.

The day that this message was flashed from the heart of the Caucasus a great memorial service was held at the Orthodox Armenian Holy Cross Church in West Hoboken, and Dr. M. S. Gabriel denounced the priest as a "beast in clerical garb." But Martougeyan's friends stuck.

Martougeyan Determined.

He sat in the Athens Hotel, in West 45th street, yesterday, with Miran Sevassian, a Boston lawyer, and James J. Jordan, who says he is a member of the International Society of Anarchists, with headquarters in Basle, Switzerland. The priest and ex-convict seemed to be as determined as when he was convicted, and his grim, piercing black eyes gave the lie to his quiet voice.

"I know that I was a victim of the Sultan's machinations," he said, in almost perfect English. "New York was alive with Turkish spies, and the police of this city and Boston helped them. You don't believe it? Let me tell you something. One day Moushegh Shahin, Sarkis Hovsepian, Panagian, L. Ashkan, Sourgen Sourgenian and A. Krikorian, Sourgen Sourgenian and A. Krikorian were arrested and taken to the Mulberry street station house. They were photographed and knocked about the station house, and then put in cells. After a time they were released. I will tell you why that was. Last year when the old regime was overturned in Turkey the photographs were found in the files of the Secret Service. On the bottom of each was the signature of Commissioner Wood, Chief of Police Watts of Boston was in communication with Sahin Pacha and the latter asked the chief to send him photographs of prominent Hunchakists in Boston."

Martougeyan sat with folded hands and calmly reviewed the story of the Hunchakist disorders that stirred New York in 1907. He still wears the garb of a priest, holding that he was wrongfully expelled from his church, and that the charges brought against him were false. He says that he had been out of the Hunchakist Society a full year when he was condemned, and that the extortion indictments were absurd, as he was only collecting money to aid the Armenians.

Pressure from Turkey.

He further said that many of the merchants who worked against him in his trials contributed money freely until pressure was brought to bear upon them from Turkey to cease, and to have him sent to prison. Gulbaki Gulbenkian, the fifth avenue rug merchant (Martougeyan spells it Gulbanyan) wrote him, he says, that he had received a letter which he thought was from a Turkish society.

"Afterward Gulbanyan said he thought the Turkish Consul General brought pressure to bear," said Father Martougeyan. "I would like to see the consul general. I would like to ask him how those photographs found their way to Constantinople."

The priest was released from Sing Sing on August 27, but was almost immediately rearrested on three indictments similar to those for which he was imprisoned. He says that his enemies wished to have him continue in prison, but that Judge Malone dismissed the indictments on September 8, in Part III of the Supreme Court.

A mass meeting was held last night in the Murray Hill Lyceum, and Father Martougeyan told the Armenians and Turks who happened to be present just how he stood in the whole matter. Plain clothes men were not noticeable in the audience, but they were there, although they had no work to do. It was all as quiet as a church. Just after the priest stopped talking it was announced that a collection would be taken up for the Armenians, and most of the American-bred brothers fled quickly out. Afterward resolutions, introduced by Mr. Gossens, were passed, expressing confidence in Martougeyan and asking that he be restored to his place in the church and denouncing the New York and Boston police.

The Martougeyan adherents say that if he does not get back his priestly office the "strike against God" will be instituted not only in New York but in all cities where Armenians live, and that Armenian children will remain unbaptized until the deposed priest is a priest again in every sense of the word.

Roosevelt Has Quiet Day

Rests with Family Before Beginning Strenuous Week.

Oyster Bay, Sept. 18.—Theodore Roosevelt returned to Sagamore Hill at noon and spent the remainder of the day quietly with his family, preparatory to the strenuous week before him.

During the few remaining days before the Saratoga convention Mr. Roosevelt will be occupied in measuring his political strength and conferring with Progressive leaders from all parts of the state. Meanwhile he will put the finishing touches on the speech to be delivered before the convention.

With his enemies in the forces of the "old guard" literally in the open on the floor of the convention, it is understood he is preparing to make a supreme effort in attacking their policies and tactics from the platform.

In recent conversations with his friends Mr. Roosevelt has expressed himself as confident that a majority of the delegates will support him for temporary chairman of the convention. Nassau County will elect its delegates to the Republican convention on Tuesday, and there seems to be no doubt now that he will head the delegation. He declined absolutely to-day to discuss the report that he would oppose at the Saratoga convention any indorsement of President Taft for 1912.

The Progressive delegates, it is understood, will support any indorsement of the Taft administration, provided it does not include an indorsement of President Taft for renomination in 1912.

There is a growing belief that Henry L. Stimson, former United States District Attorney, is Mr. Roosevelt's choice as candidate for Governor. It is said Mr. Stimson is favored also by a majority of the Progressive leaders. Whether Mr. Stimson will be the final choice of the Progressives will be settled at the conference of the leaders before the end of the week. Mr. Roosevelt will probably go to Saratoga a week from to-morrow, to be on the ground the day before the convention opens.

Cockran Likes Roosevelt

Says Abhorrence to Republican Machines Is Nation-Wide.

W. Bourke Cockran, accompanied by his wife and her father, H. C. Ide, the American Minister to Spain, arrived yesterday on the French liner Lorraine. He left New York on July 2. Mr. Cockran had some pleasant things to say for Theodore Roosevelt, and declared that the overthrow of the Republicans in Maine signified a nationwide abhorrence to the Republican machine.

"If Mr. Roosevelt accepts the nomination for Governor of the State of New York," said Mr. Cockran, "what will he do next? He would have nothing to gain by taking it. No man in his senses will attempt to tell what will take place in 1912. Before that time comes there may be death, pestilence and famine."

"Mr. Roosevelt, however, is an unusual man. He is such an extraordinary man that no one can reason about him from any precedent. You can find no precedent for him. He is the embodiment of passionate attachment to the elementary virtues. He does not steal and he does not covet his neighbor's wife. If a man did these things in his private life, Roosevelt would knock him down. Others believe in the same thing, but they only talk about it."

Among those who arrived on the Lorraine were Professor Gottlieb, Mr. and Mrs. John W. Alexander, Mr. and Mrs. R. T. W. Duke, W. M. Chase and William C. Carl, the organist.

President Off for West

Leaves Boston at Midnight for Cincinnati.

Beverly, Mass., Sept. 18.—President Taft's last day before his departure for Cincinnati was passed quietly at the summer White House, where he enjoyed the mild breezes of a perfect September day. He left Boston to-night at midnight for New Haven, accompanied by Captain Butt, his military aid.

Secretary Norton will join the President at New Haven to-morrow and go with him to Cincinnati. Mr. Taft will return to Beverly on October 2 for a fortnight, after which the summer White House will be closed and the family will return to Washington.

Mrs. Taft will remain at Beverly during the President's absence on the present trip. President Taft's itinerary, in brief, follows: September 18, leave Boston midnight; September 19, arrive New Haven at 5 a. m.; depart at 2 p. m. the same day for Cincinnati direct by way of Springfield, Albany, Buffalo and Cleveland, arriving in Cincinnati at 1:50 p. m. September 20, leave Cincinnati for Washington October 2, arriving there at 9 o'clock the following morning. The Atlantic City end of the trip has been abandoned.

Taft Visits Yale To-Day

Goes to New Haven as Member of the Corporation.

New Haven, Sept. 18.—Coming as a member of the Yale Corporation, and not in his official capacity as President of the United States, President Taft will spend a few hours in New Haven to-morrow and then depart for the West. In view of the fact that he will be here as a member of the corporation, there will be no formal demonstration, and perhaps not any, unless he is recognized as he is hurried from the railroad station to Woodbridge Hall in an automobile.

The fall meeting of the Yale Corporation, which is one of the most important of the year, will be especially so to-morrow, as it is expected that the matter of the increase of the salaries of the professors will be brought up for discussion. It is also possible that the appointment of President Hexter of the university to the railroad bonding commission will be brought up and arrangements made whereby he may devote a part of his time to that work. Otto T. Barnard, of New York, will attend as a corporate member for the first time.

The meeting is held earlier than usual this year, owing to the coming departure of President Taft for Germany, where he is to speak at the anniversary exercises of the University of Berlin on October 20.

Campaign Expenses Refused

Colorado Auditor Refuses to Honor Democratic Warrant for \$32,000.

Denver, Sept. 18.—The State Auditor, Mr. Keneshan, yesterday refused to issue a warrant for \$32,000 demanded by the Democratic state organization under the state law providing campaign expenses to others than candidates, and in lieu thereof binding the state to pay party organizations 25 cents for each vote for their respective tickets at state elections. Mr. Keneshan contends that the law is unconstitutional.

The chairman of the State Democratic Committee said that he will ask the Supreme Court to-morrow for an alternate view of maintaining the law, and that he will pay over the amount demanded or show cause why they should not do so.

A Secretary Also Slightly Hurt by a Bullet in Guadalupe.

Pointe-a-Pitre, Guadalupe, Sept. 18.—It now appears that the son of Governor Gautret and the general secretary of the Court of Appeals were slightly wounded by the shots fired at the Governor's carriage yesterday. The president of the court and the councillor, who were also in the carriage, were not injured. It is supposed that the attempt was directed against the president, who is unpopular in Guadalupe.

Cholera Figures from Italy.

Rome, Sept. 18.—Six new cases of Asiatic cholera and two deaths are reported in southern Italy in the last twenty-four hours.

Atlas Is Labor Emblem

New Party Makes Announcement and States Its Aims.

To Be National in Scope

Leaders Say Requests to Join Movement Are Pouring In from All Sides.

The officers of the Federated Labor party, which was formed about four weeks ago by delegates from unions throughout greater New York, announced its adoption of a party emblem yesterday. The first steps in organizing the party were taken by prominent delegates of the Central Federated Union and the general committee of the party reported that the enrollment of members will go on rapidly now that it has an emblem.

The emblem agreed on is Atlas supporting the earth and over the emblem are the words, "Labor Supports the World." The plan of the party which was adopted states its principal aims as follows:

The party will advocate the election of candidates for all public offices who will consider the rights of all citizens equally, so that the working people will receive the justice due them.

We want the legislative bodies of the municipalities, state and nation to serve the best interests of the people of this country and not serve exclusively the interests of the corporations.

The trade unions of the country and of the world have been doing more to improve the conditions of the workers in the industrial field than any other body yet formed, and we are fully convinced that if the workers of this country are organized politically they can do more for themselves politically within a few years than would be done for them by candidates of political parties who have no interest in the workers beyond obtaining their votes on election days, forgetting all about them between elections.

The intention of the leaders of the party, it was stated, is, after the campaign of this year is over, to begin work in enlarging its membership, so that it will take in other cities and gradually become a national body. After a conference with the other officers of the party a statement was issued last evening by Edward I. Hannah, its secretary-treasurer, which said that by October 1 Assembly district organizations will have been established throughout the entire city, and among other things added:

The officers of the Federated Labor party have received large numbers of letters from voters throughout the State of New York as well as from every part of the city, seeking information regarding the party, and the Federated Labor party during the coming fall campaign.

Urgent requests have come from cities up the state where great numbers of workmen are employed, asking that the boundaries of the party be extended beyond New York City, and those from whom the requests come are willing to give their time and money to the party.

Communications have also been received from workmen in the city of New York, who are willing to give their time and money to the party.

The Federated Labor party is organized as a protest against the conditions of the working men, women and children who toil for their daily bread, but also of the great mass of small merchants and manufacturers who are equally suffering from the burdens imposed by the big corporations, which control every commodity that is produced in this country.
