

CHARGED WITH MANY CRIMES.

Mrs. Ellen E. Peck was yesterday arrested in her home, 307 Putnam avenue, Brooklyn, on a charge of obtaining \$150 worth of jewelry from John H. Johnson of 150 Bowery in this city, on June 18. Mrs. Peck, who is 51 years old, has a slight, willowy figure, and she seems to be a consumptive. Her face is pale and wrinkled, and her auburn hair is faintly streaked with gray. She has expressive blue eyes that seem to see everything within their range, and has very prepossessing manners. The police took up her as one of the most singular women they have ever had to deal with. She lives in a neat two-story brick house, richly furnished inside with fine carpets, curtains, and pictures, and it is kept as neat as waxwork. Her first arrest was on a charge of having received stolen goods. A watch which was stolen from a guest in a Broadway hotel was traced to her possession, but after an examination in the Tombs Police Court she was discharged.

Next she was arrested on a charge of having obtained \$19,000 in Government bonds from B. Tubbitt upon representing that she could recover from his defrauding bookkeeper \$250,000 in bonds which had been stolen; but although she was held for the action of the Grand Jury in this case, she was released on a civil suit instituted against herself and husband by Mr. Tubbitt were never filed. She was next arrested on a charge of having obtained \$10,000 in Grand jury peddler, \$19,000 worth of diamonds, out of about \$30,000 worth, which he had intrusted to her management that she could dispose of at a profit. She had many and influential friends. Twenty-five indictments were found against her in connection with the grand jury peddler. After a trial in the Court of Sessions she was found guilty. A pole proscuit was entered to a number of indictments, but there are said to be thirteen in the King's County District Attorney's office.

She was arrested some time ago in a civil suit on complaint of a piano dealer from whom she had obtained a piano on credit, and had disposed of it; but after remaining in Raymond street jail for some time, she was discharged, bound over to pay her board.

The complainant in the civil suit, Mr. John H. Johnson, of Mott Avenue and 149th street in this city, who obtained a warrant on Mrs. Peck, came into his store on June 18, and after examining a watch, a chain, and a ring worth \$150, she asked if he would sell them upon credit.

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
