

AMERICAN HORSES ABROAD

WHAT THEY HAVE DONE AND THEIR PROSPECTS IN THE FUTURE.

Influence of Messrs. Croker and Dwyer's Campaign in England—Growing Export Trade in American Trotters—A Note on Purchase for the Austrian Government—The Trotting Stallion Shepherd—F. Knapp as a Backer in England—Park Horses for the Paris Bois de Boulogne.

Every good American must have felt a thrill of patriotic pride yesterday upon reading the news that the steamship Mississippi had sailed for London with twenty-one thoroughbred horses on board, belonging to Richard Croker and M. F. Dwyer.

In the history of international horse racing the facts are all in favor of the Americans. We have won the English Derby, the St. Leger, the Cambridge, the Cesarewitch and about all the classic events of the British turf, and this with comparatively few attempts, while of the hundreds of English horses imported into this country not one has of late years beaten the flower of the American turf in any important race.

It is safe to say that if Iroquois and Foxhall could have happened along in the year 1804, instead of 1851, to capture the Derby and other classic events, no legislative measure aimed at the life of racing would have got very far in this State. And, perhaps, racing men in New York could now make no more sagacious move in the interest of the sport than to open negotiations with the patrons of the turf in England looking to a series of international contests between the best horses of both countries.

Not much less important than the expedition of Messrs. Croker and Dwyer in its bearing upon American horse-breeding interests is the purchase made last week at the Kellogg sale of trotting stock by the commissioners of the Austrian Government. Seven good specimens of the distinctively American breed were received by the foreign buyers, and it is understood that their purchase at the same price will be made at the Tattersall's sale at Buffalo this week in addition to some important private transactions which are being consummated.

A NEW FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION.

EMERITS IN BRING BROOKLYN, YALE, PENNSYLVANIA, AND PRINCETON TOGETHER.

It is quietly hinted among college men that an effort will be made by certain influential graduates to form a new intercollegiate football association, to consist of Princeton, Yale, Harvard, and Pennsylvania. The idea is to equalize matters and to have the intercollegiate championship question definitely settled.

At an expert said the other day: "The intercollegiate association, as it now exists, can form rules to suit itself and at the same time handicap the Pennsylvania and Princeton graduate advisory committee whose rulings are of about the same kind as those of the intercollegiate association, and the rules and regulations thus adopted must necessarily be absolutely no voice in the matter. Harvard and Pennsylvania should have the same authority in governing the football that Princeton and Yale have, and the only way to bring that about is to organize a new association."

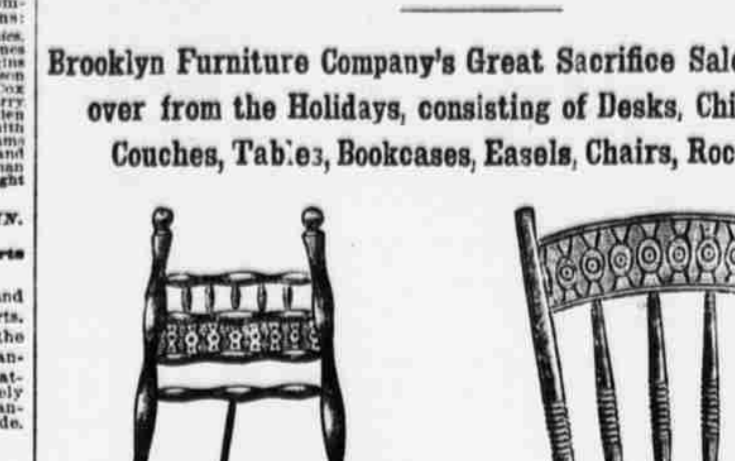
