#### THIS STATE IN THE WAR.

A TOTAL OF 24,000 MEN FURNISHED.

GEN. TILLINGBAST SAYS. New York's Part in the Spanish-American Struggle Reviewed in the Adjutant-General's Annual Report-The Recent Management of the National Guard Defended

ALBANY, Jan. 3.-The annual report of Adit. Gen. C. Whitney Tillinghast, second, is in the hands of ex-Gov. Black. It is devoted chiefly to a review of the work of the Adiatant-General's Department during the Spanish-Ameri-can war. The correspondence which passed between the Adjutant-General and the Wash-ington authorities and the National Guard officials is included, as well as the reports of Major-Gen. Ros and the camp commanders.

The report says that under the two calls of the President for volunteers, the State of New York furnished, under the first, 12,460 officers and cullsted men, and under the second 3,772 recruits, and 4,185 officers and enlisted men, making a total of 20,418, of whom 210 were cavairy, 325 artillers and 18,893 infantry. Besides these, a number of men enlisted in regiments and companies after the muster in of the latter. Including such cullstments and the men furnished by the navel militia to the United States Navy, it is safe to say that this State furnished for the Namish-American war at least 24,900, men. The number of officers and cullstell men of the navae militia who entered the United States service is \$51, or more than 80 per cent, of the whole force.

As the State equipments were taken by the volunteers from this State into the United States service it became necessary to replace this property to keep the National Guard in a serviceable condition and 15 arm and equipte he new, organization. To do so 10,600 Spring-field rifles of 45 calibre and 500,000 counds of ammunition were obtained from the United States Government, and there were purchased cartridge belts, Merriam nacks, wall suid central tents, blankers, pouchos, legging, overcoats, blouses, trousers, canteens, haversacks, cooking outfits, mess articles and a full surprival medical stores. Provision will ret have to be made for uniforms for the part of the Nasional Guard, now returning or about to return from the United States volunteers service. As to other expenses incurred on account of the volunteers from this State and paid from the var appropriation, vouchers of accounts which should be reimbursed by the United States Government have been turned over to Richard Crowley, State Agent for prosecuting claims against the United States. The first instalment prepared by him and presented to the United States auditing officer amounts to \$300,200. A number of accounts have been collected since then, and more will no doubt yet be received to make the total amount of claims to be presented at least \$120,000.

To this are to be added the pay of New York volunteers received by them from the State, the expenses incurred in making these payments, and the pay of officers who were on duty with, but not of, the National Guard organizations until the latter were mustered into the United States service. These items will amount, in round numbers, no doubt, to \$180,000. The total charge of this State against the United States will therefore amount in a round sum \$880,000. SARD TON

In conclusion Adit. Gen. Tillinghast says:
The many criticisms made against the State authorities were unfounded, uncharitable and generally based on misconceptions, personal interests or colitical grounds. I have no hesitancy in saying that everything within reason has been done for the National Guard and New York State volunteers in the war with Spain. Time must elapse, how long I cannot say, before a just history of your military administration will be written. I believe that in the future the National Guard, necause of its experience during the last year, will be stronger, more compact and more efficient than ever before in its history, but to assure this, its nigher officers must be spared the rubile assaults which it has been the lot off many in the past to bear.

"The National Guard is to-day as efficient, if not more so, than when you became its Commander-in-Chief; it it be not, it is due to the fact that public defamation of its ranking officers was encouraged by persons who had their own ends to serve.
