ASPHALT RECEIVER MACK SYAYS, Court Beeldes That No Charges Have Been Proven Against Mim.

TRENTON, N. J., June 9.-A petition by William C. Bullett of Philadelphia, asking for the removal of John M. Mack as one of the receivers of the Asphalt Company of America, was denied to-day by Judge Kirkpatrick in the United States Circuit Court. The petition recites in detail the history of the consolidation of the asphalt companies and charges that Mack, by reason of his affliations with the proceed-lags incident to the combine, is not a person to act as receiver.

The petition laid special stress on the allegation that the conversion of stock of the Asphalt Company of America into that of the National Asphalt Company and the consequent issue of certificates aggregating \$55,000,000 was a fradulent

aggregating \$55,000,000 was a fradulent over-capitalisation. It also charged that by reason of this transfer the stock of the American Company has been exempted from liability of about \$24,000,000 owing on the original stock.

In refusing the petition Judge Kirkpatrick said that there were no verified charges against Mack which require the Court to remove him as receiver. More than \$18,000,000 worth of the certificates asked that Mack should be appointed, and this, the Court said, should have consideration in preference to the objection of the tion in preference to the objection of the storous worth of certificates represented by the petition. The Court further said that it did not appear in the petition how bullett came into possession of the cer-tificates, and that it was possible that they were secured for the sole purpose of ap-pearing in the suit now before the court. The charge of overcapitalization, the Court said, had not been established.

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL.

The stock market furnished to-day additional evidence of the tenacity with which both investors and speculators hold their securities. They unquestionably have great confidence in the immediate future of the business of the country. At the same time the dulness of the market, which was as pronounced as at any time since the anthracite coal strike began, shows that they are not disposed to increase their ventures pending a determination of the extremely important question involved in that strike. What is likely to happen when that question is satisfactorily disposed of was indicated to-day by the strength of the market, resulting apparently from a mistaken notion that the President of the United States has undertaken to bring about an adjustment of the differences between the owners of the anthracite coal mines and their employees. The wisdom of the action of the President in directing the Federal liminary investigation of the present labor trouble remains to be proved by time. At the moment it will doubtless have the effect of strengthening the members of the United Mine Workers' organization in the position they have taken, and, as they have endeavored to enforce their demands by destroying property and by attacking those who are willing to fill their places, this circumstance cannot but be It is possible that an official investigation

of the situation in the anthracite regions will enlighten the public as to the real issue and, if that occurs, much will be gained. It is not possible, however, for the Federal Government to interfere unless it is called upon by those who have a right to invoke its aid to relieve the embargo that has been placed upon interstate commerce by the arbitrary action of the labor organizations and the lawlessness of many of their members. The professional element on the Stock Exchange apparently ignored these serious considerations and jumped to the conclusion that the interest in the matter shown by the head of the Executive Department of the Government foreshadows s speedy termination of the struggle. Moderate purchases by the element referred to resulted in an easy and moderate advance in prices. The heaviest dealings, however, were not in the coal stocks, but in Sugar Refining, Atchison common and St. Paul. The market for the two last named was influenced favorably by excellent crop prosnects, while the advance in Sugar Refining was traceable to a slight advance in the price of the company's product and to a better outlook for the enactment of the Cuban reciprocity measure.

Less active stocks that were conspicuously strong were American Car and Foun-Hocking Valley common and St. Louis Southwestern preferred. The denial by be United States Circuit Court of an anplication for an injunction to restrain the United States Steel Corporation from carrying out its programme for converting twofifths of its preferred stock into debenture bonds had very little effect upon the market for the steel stocks, possibly because a similar action was begun in the New Jersey State courts this afternoon. The purpose of this litigation is so well understood that it should have no effect at all upon the securities of the company involved. Irrespective of the outcome of this speculative litigation, the corporation is going ahead with its enormous and steadily increasing business, a condition of affairs which, according to those most competent to judge of the future of the iron and steel industry, is likely to continue or many months to come.
