The State Practically Agreed Upon, but There May Be One or Two Changes Strong Indorsement of Roosevelt Southern Representation to Come Up.

COLUMBUS. Ohio, May 30 .- Senator Hanna's withdrawal of his objection to the unqualified indorsement of President Roosevelt for the nomination for President 1904 has robbed the Republican State Convention, to be held here on next Wednesday and Thursday, of all promise of ex-The outlook now is for a harmonious meeting, with few real contests and with no display of factionalism. The leaders have practically agreed upon the State ticket to be nominated, and the platform, drawn in these times of peace and plenty will be more like a proclamation of thanksgiving for blessings, past and present, than a challenge to the enemy.

This is the present slate: Governor, Myron T. Herrick, Cleveland; Lieutenant-Governor, Warren G. Harding, Marion; Auditor of State, W. D. Guilbert, Caldwell; treasurer. W S McKinnon, Ashtabula; Judge of the Supreme Court, A. N. Summers, Springrield: Attorney-General, Wade Ellis, Cindinati; State Commissioner of Common Schools, I. D. Bonebrake, Mount Vernon; member of State Board of Public Works, George H. Watkins, Wakefield.

There is a faint chance that the slate may be smashed in one or two cases. Two of the candidates, supposed to be sure of success, are out for third terms, and that fact is gailing to some of the rank and file. It is useless to deny, also, that many Republicans are becoming restless under the long-continued supremacy of the leaders of the party. They are weary of following and some of the delegates to the meeting pext week may feel like asserting themselves. The forecast of the convention's work would be incomplete without making note of the increasing movement toward

No surprises are expected in the platform to be adopted. The plank of most general interest, of course, is that which declares Ohio's faith in Roosevelt and her wish that he be nominated for the Presidency in 1904. The declaration will be couched in the most forcible language possible and there is some speculation as to whether a Hanna man or a Foraker man will have the honor of presenting it to the convention. Its unanimous indorsement is assured.

The five Constitutional amendments approved by the last Legislature will all be indorsed in the platform. The enemies of that which gives the Governor the limited veto power have been engaged actively in picking flaws in the wording and the punctuation of the measure, but there seems to be no doubt that it will be indorsed with the rest. with the rest.
One plank, which has been prepared by

Gen. Dick and which probably will have place in the platform, calls for the reduction of representation in Congress from the South because of the suppression of the negro vote. This is an innovation in Ohio, although the Ohio delegation in Congress has been active in urging the House onio, atriougn the Onio delegation in Congress has been active in urging the House to bestir itself in the way indicated. If the plank is finally incorporated in the State platform, it will mean renewed agitation of the issue in question in other States and in the national campaign next year.

Senator Hanna, as temporary chairman of the convention, will have the opportunity of sounding the keynote and he will disappoint every delegate in the hall if he does not furnish in his speech the slogan of the coming campaign. "We know our business," "Let well enough alone," and "Stand pat" were all heard first at Republican State gatherings.
