The most noted of the recent strikes is on the north branch of the Ventna, south of Mount Foraker, in the Susitna Valley. The first discovery here was made by R. F. Miller, who had his gold run into a brick at Seward. He had a crude outfit, but secured all the machinery and supplies necessary with the gold he had taken out, and returned to the Yentna, where he will work all winter. These are as permanent. Twelve holes had been sunk fifty feet to bedrock, every hole proving good pay. Five creeks in the district have been prospected successfully.
