legislature of the States mingled with the "twelve bridges of old Ireland," as the probable result of the election was discussed. Gentlemen with open glasses, and "smoys" without, were gathered together in a "gorgeous hall."

Of course it could not be expected that the City in session could cause Fulton street to be cleared on any occasion, and several of the crowd "sat in the mud" which was then existing piled up in soft and sticky heaps near the curb-stones, in the atmosphere of the unscrupulous individuals congregated together, who, if they had not been clear their noses this morning, will find them so now, very early Saturday morning next.

As the blacks on the bulletin began to fill up, the crowd said that it seemed a mounted affair altogether. Who the negroes from twenty of the wards were recorded, one man said that he thought "such a majority would weigh the negroes' weight down."

"Yes," said his neighbor,

"if you had twenty-six thousand weight upon you I think it would not weigh you down but crush you to smash." When the whole of the wards returned and the final result in the city were given, the shock of the crowd was very heavy. Several of the individuals proposed "Three cheers for the Union," which were all heartily given. Others joined in two political songs kind of chorus, as follows:—One, two, three, four, five, six—digger, digger, digger, and—One, two, three—Bell Everett—had him," winding each up with a hearty laugh. Three thousand men of groans ("had him") were given for Lincoln, winding up with a very suspicious kind of sound, certainly not very complimentary to that gentleman.

As several of the crowd began to lament what they termed the "miseries of the majority of the Union party" others tried to console them with the fact that "King county would reverse the error." Wagons were cheered and accepted that that part would "give ten thousand for the Union," while others declared it "would not give three." One very disinterested individual loudly asserted that "the New Yorkers were a parcel of niggers living banks," and he was ashamed of the people of the city of New York.

When the transparency had the words, "According to me that he received, Abraham Lincoln is elected President," written thereon, the statement was greeted with "Hooray" and "hoorahs" almost without number.

A proportion to give three cheers for Lincoln only resulted in a repetition of the same derogatory sounds. Very few of those around the bulletin office received the news with satisfaction.

When news from the upper windows of the surrounding buildings the living house, which at one time reached from half way along Failes street, between Nassau street and Broadway, to about the same distance along the adjoining block in one direction, and from Ann street to near John, along Nassau, presented such a spectacle that must be witnessed to be fully understood; and the scene that arose therefore more resembled the "train of distant thunder" than might also we can think of present.

WIDE AWAKE PROCESSION BROKEN INTO A GENERAL HOW—KNIVES, PISTOLS AND LANCES DRAWN

About twenty minutes past twelve o'clock this morning, a procession of W. D. awakes without torches or uniforms, marched through the park from Broadway, and followed and cheered at the Tribune and Times offices. The procession was preceded by a banner, on which was painted, life size, a representation of Abraham Lincoln in black sleeves, hand at work with a brush sweeping the Union before him. The procession was loudly cheered as it passed the above office, and in a few minutes they started on their march, hundreds joining in the ranks and singing a camp song in the tone of Dixie's Land. They marched four abreast, and the head of the procession was opposite the Astor House with the rear opposite Beckman street. They were cheering as they were passing the Astor House, when a gang of powder birds came to the head of the procession, took down their banner, and commenced to knock the Wide Awake down, and in a moment the supporters were surrounded, and a free fight ensued, which lasted about fifteen minutes. Knives and pistols were drawn, and the former used. Clubs and stones were flung in all directions. The Wide Awakes for outnumbering their opponents, and put them down by main force, but not before several were maimed. They were called into line and marched up Broad
