Statement of the Dying Woman Who Could Not Die in Peace Until the Child Was Rescued from Her Tormentors-

Growing Public Interest in the Case.
The case of the little child, Mary Ellen McCorck, has evidently excited a wide spread feeling of interest in her behalf. Already a number of ladies, whose sympathies have been moved by the painful recitals of the barbarous cruelties inflicted upon her by her inhuman stepmother and whose benevolent impulses have also, doubtless, been additionally stirred by the exceeding sprightoffered to take care of her. As Mr. Gerry, who with Mr. Ambrose Monell, is acting as counsel for Mr. Bergh in the case, came into the court room o the Coart of Oyer and Terminer yesterday, where the examination was to be resumed, a letter was handed him from a leading merchant of the city offering to adopt the child. And this young life,

offering to adopt the child. And this young life, so crushed and trampled upon in the bud, is likely, after all, to blossom into brightness and beauty.
