Play It Safe This Holiday

"Most people enjoy Christmas shopping, even though it requires effort and money," Police Chief Weaver said today. "There's a certain satisfaction in making that last purchase and getting back home to relax—a big task has been completed and they can look forward to Christmas with pleasure, knowing they've done a big share of helping to make it a happy time."

"Motorists who have already prepared their cars for safe driving during the winter months ahead are enjoying a similar satisfaction. They can look forward to winter knowing they've prepared their cars to meet the challenge of snow, ice and cold weather."

But motorists who haven't winterized their cars are in a much more risky position than Christmas shoppers who haven't done more than make out a list. They're running the risk of unnecessary injury, even death, for themselves and their families.

Chief Weaver offered these rules for safe winter driving:

1. Avoid skidding by "pumping" your brakes, rather than jamming them and locking your wheels.
2. Get the "feel" of the road when starting out on slippery mornings by testing your brakes while driving slowly and away from traffic.
3. Never follow the car ahead too closely; allow safe stopping distances to avoid rear-end collisions.
4. Install and use safety belts for yourself and your passengers to minimize injury and possible death in the event of an accident.
5. Be sure of good vision by clearing your windshield wiper blades, defrosters and all lights are in good working condition.
6. Get the best possible traction by using a complete set of reinforced tire chains when needed; they cut stopping distance in half and give four to seven times more traction on packed snow and ice, according to results of tests conducted by the National Safety Council.
