To Compare Elementary Art Work

The grade schools will be dismissed early tomorrow afternoon, Friday, the 18th, in order that your children's teachers may visit the All-Schools Art Exhibit in Prospect School gymnasium. This display of elementary pupils' art work, announced in this column some weeks ago, will assemble in one place for the first time samples of children's art work from all six elementary schools in the city.

from the Kindergarten through the sixth grade.

The purpose of this exhibit is chiefly to show each teacher what art work is being done by other children of the same age level as her own pupils. In this way, it is hoped, new ideas for school art projects will be spread around in the quickest possible manner, and everyone's concept of what can be done with art in the grades will be broadened and refreshed.

This useful project is in overall charge of Mr. Bruce Holderbaum, teacher of art at Shaw High School and Art Supervisor for the elementary schools. He has been assembling samples of work of many kinds from all the schools this Fall, with the assistance of a committee composed of elementary teachers representing all the buildings, and between them they have selected and arranged the items to be exhibited. The result is a regular temporary art gallery in Pros-

pect gymnasium, with types of artistic creation arranged by grade levels in order to facilitate viewing.

Teachers who have helped in the selection of artistic work from their own buildings are: Caledonia, Mrs. Ruth E. Welter; Chambers, Mrs. Carlotta Schwartz; Mayfair, Mrs. Joyce Townsend; Prospect, Mrs. Dolores Waldron; Rozelle, Miss Twila Gimmet; and Superior, Mr. John Jirus.

One of the surprises in a collection of this kind is the tremendous number of materials that can be pressed into service by a child to express himself artistically. Wire, leaves, paper, rags, spoons, sticks—almost anything that a youngster can handle and shape, he can make into something that presents a picture to his mind. It's astonishing, too, the number of times that the weirdest kinds of objects actually look like the things they are supposed to be representing.

Shaw-Lakewood Game Friday Key Contest In LEL Race

Tomorrow night Shaw travels West to take on the Lakewood Rangers.

Picked by experts as a key game in the L.E.L. race, the Cards face the problem of stopping the rampaging Rangers. Unbeaten in seven contests Lakewood has averaged 79.4 points per game. Their steadfast attack can be attributed to a starting squad of six footers, notably forwards Phil Dubensky, 6' 3" and Dale Evans, 6' 4".

With the L.E.L. race reaching the half-way point, the Kibbel men are confronted by two possibilities: they can either tie for the L.E.L. lead by defeating the Rangers, or lose and drop two games off the pace.

On the basis of past performances against Lakewood, the other L.E.L. teams offer little hope that they can upset the westsiders. Therefore, Shaw must go forth and accomplish the task themselves. Whatever the Cards may lack in height, the excell in speed and scrappiness.

Last week Shaw easily subdued the Shaker Raiders 90-70 at Shaw. Holding a slim 18-17 lead in the first quarter, Shaw soon broke the game wide open on Tom Matte's marksmanship. The 5' 11" senior whose 32 points were high for the evening, contributed 6 points in the closing three minutes of the second quarter to give the Cards a

42-31 lead at the intermission. Both team played end to end basketball in the second half with Shaw dominating the play. Harry Putzbach, Tony Yacubucci and Mike Brophy hit the double figures with 14, 12, and 10 points respectively.

The 50 points fell one point of the school record set in 1912 when Shaw defeated Spencerian 91-7.

The Shaw Jaycees extended their winning streak to 8 straight games with a 61-55 verdict over Shaker. Ken Connell led the attack with 18 points.
