What Changes in the Zoning Laws Do You Envision Over the Next Ten Years To Maintain Our Community?

#### JOINT STATEMENT OF EWERS - SCHOLL - STEVENSON

The immediate appointment to a responsible and active city planning commission, consisting of five (5) members according to the state law, one of which members would be a merchant, the proper member of the city commission and others not connected with the city government.

Said planning commission would at once make a comprehensive study of the zoning laws, housing codes, etc., to determine if they fit into the general plan of rejuvenating the city with particular emphasis on the following:

1. Restrictions on the type of zoning along our main arteries and enforcement of same to prevent our business districts from becoming an area of unsightly makeshift warehouses and gas stations.

2. The immediate issuance of councilmanic bonds for the purpose of taking property by eminent domain for off-street parking in the Hayden Avenue, Nela-

Noble and other areas where it may become necessary. 3. Use remaining funds of the sewer bond issue to ensure sewers of proper capacity to meet future needs and changes in the zoning laws.

4. To preserve our parks and recreational areas and prevent them from being for commercial development unless other areas are substituted.

5. A realistic housing code and enforcement thereof with the purpose of pro tecting our neighborhoods and the property thereof.

6. The removal of unsigntly eyescres, for example those which exist at East 133rd Street and many tree lawns located near churches and in our residential areas.

7. The adoption of an Urban Renewal Commission to formulate a general plan to rejuvenate our deteriorating areas with authority to take property by eminent domain over a long range plan and to determine the best re-use of the land so taken. The said commission, when taking such property, must enable it to go back on the tax duplicate with a long life expectancy at several times its former assessed value. Said land would be finally available for sale to private

8. Crowded rundown structures must be demolished or rehabilitated according to the merits of each case. New or improved streets are to be laid out to conform with the city's overall thoroughfare and land use plan. Better housing and newer commercial structures should be geared to modern needs and long years of stabilized values.

9. The use of federal funds would be considered if it became necessary to effect the foregoing program.

10. Responsble, positive citizens must participate. If our city is to have a future, if our city is to prevent further population shrinkage and attract the many peoples from other communities, we must have a prosperous and thriving amunity, a community of order, beauty and justice.

1. FILLING OF VACANCIES IN THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY. ed by Resolution of the General Assembly of Ohio. A majority affirmative vote is necessary for passage.)

SHALL SECTION 11 OF ARTICLE II OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF OHIO BE AMENDED, RELATIVE TO THE FILLING OF VACANCIES IN THE SENATE?

## EXPLANATION:

our State Constitution any vacancy occurring either in the House or the Senate shall be filled by election. It is proposed to amend this section of the Constitution so that a vacancy in the Senate shall be filled by appointment by the members of the Senate who are of the same political party as the person last elected to the vacant seat. If the vacancy occurs during the first 20 months of the 4-year Senatorial term, the new appointee shall only serve until the end of the even-numbered year in which the next general election is held. The remainder of the vacated term shall be filled at

2. CONTINUITY OF STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS. (Proposed by Resolution of the General Assembly of Ohio. A majority affirmative vote is necessary for passage.)

SHALL ARTICLE II OF THE CONSTITUTION BE AMENDED BY ADDING SECTION 42 THERETO TO PROVIDE FOR CONTINUITY OF GOVERNMENTAL OPERATIONS IN EMERGENCIES CAUSED BY ENEMY ATTACK?

This addition to the Constitution is proposed in order to give the General Assembly the power to appoint or arrange for the prompt election of temporary government officials if such a need occurs; also, to adopt other measures necessary to insure continuity of government operations.

## 3. MILITIA.

(Proposed by Resolution of the General Assembly of Ohio. A majority affirmative SHALL SECTIONS 1, 3, AND 4 OF ARTICLE IX OF THE OHIO CONSTITUTION

BE AMENDED TO EXTEND THE AGE LIMITS OF THE MILITIA; TO DESCRIBE THE CIRCUMSTANCES FOR CALLING FORTH THE MILITIA: AND TO CLARIFY APPOINTMENTS BY THE GOVERNOR?

# EXPLANATION:

This Constitutional Amendment will:

Sec. 1. Extend the age limit of those subject to enrollment in the State militia (which is now 18-45) to 17-67. This applies to all citizens of Ohio, not only male citizens as formerly.

Sec. 3. Make the governor responsible for the appointment of such officers as may be provided by law. At present certain officers appoint those under them. Sec. 4. Give the governor power to call out the militia in the event of a disaster within the state, in addition to the present circumstances which are: to execute the

laws of the State, to suppress insurrection and to repel invasion. (Proposed by Resolution of the General Assembly of Ohio. A majority affirmative vote is necessary for passage.) SHALL ARTICLE III OF THE CONSTITUTION BE AMENDED BY ADDING SECTION 21 THERETO TO PROVIDE THAT APPOINTMENTS MAY BE MADE SUBJECT TO THE ADVICE AND CONSENT OF THE SENATE?

This addition to the Constitution would require that all appointments to State office be subject to advice and consent of the Senate.

#### CITY OFF-STREET PARKING IMPROVEMENTS

Shall bonds be issued by the City of East Cleveland for the purpose of providing a fund to pay the City's portion of the expense of acquiring land and improving the same for off-street parking of motor vehicles in the sum of \$300,000.00, and a levy of taxes be made outside of the ten mill limitation estimated by the County Auditor to average .2024 mills for each one dollar of valuation, which amounts to 2.024 cents for each one hundred dollars of valuation, for a maximum period of twenty (20) years to pay the principal and interest of such bonds.

# COUNTY OF CUYAHOGA PROPOSED BOND ISSUE

## **Z00**

(A fifty-five percent affirmative vote is necessary for passage.)

Shall bonds be issued by the County of Cuyahoga for the purpose of IMPROVING THE ZOOLOGICAL PARK TO BE ACQUIRED BY CUYAHOGA COUNTY in the sum of Two Million Five Hundred Thousand (\$2,500,000.00) Dollars and a levy of taxes be made outside of the ten mill limitation estimated by the county auditor to average 0.0399 mills for each one dollar of valuation, which amounts to 0.399 cents for each one hundred dollars of valuation, for a maximum period of fifteen (15) years to pay the principal and interest of such bonds.

## PURPOSE:

The 53-year-old main building, now housing apes, lions, and the commissary will be razed to make way for the West Boulevard extension. Services and animals displaced will be relocated in newly developed areas of the park featuring naturalistic, moated settings.

Bonds to be used for capital improvements only. Private gifts to supplement public funds.

By agreement between Cleveland officials and the County Commissioners, the Zoo will be transferred from City to County control only if this bond issue passes.
