

BELL COUNTY.

GRAND JUNCTION, TENN., May 10, 1875.—The board of commissioners of this county convened at this place, today, to compare the returns of the election, held on Saturday last for the

ment of Bell county. The original act of the legislature creating this county required the "assent of two-thirds of the voters in the area out of which it was to be formed." At the election in 1871 more than four-fifths of the vote polled was in favor of the new county, but upon injunction and appeal to the supreme court it was held "that two-thirds of the voting population had not indorsed the new county, without reference to the vote *actually cast*."

mediately passed an amendatory act giving power to the commissioners to take a census of the legal voters in the proposed new county, and to hold another election. This census was counted a short time since, and, upon due advertisement, the election was held, the second time, on last Saturday, with the following official result:
