

# GERMANS CAPTURE HEIGHTS ON MEUSE AS ALLIES FALTER

Invaders Push Lines Forward as They Maintain Terrific Bombardment of Forts on French Right Wing-Rheims Is Again Shelled.

Verdun Now Threatened on Three Sides. Von Kluk Defends Important Railway Centre of Tergnier Against Determined Attacks of French and British.

Centres of the bitterest fighting in France today are Verdun and alons the Oise and Alsne Rivers, German forces have captured Varennes, west of Verdun. The Allies claim slight gains in the enveloping movement against General von Kluk. English reinforcements are being rushed forward to strengthen the Allies' left. Terrific bombardment of the Verdun-
