Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce, Dec. 12.—Following the closing strength of yesterday and the final spurt on the curb after the close, the wheat market was strong and higher this morning, May opening at 76c. This was top for the time. Selling began in all markets. There was support, but not enough to holo it, and in an hour May had cased off to 75½@75%c. Liverpool gave a tair response and closen %@%d up. There was a strong a tone as ever at ine opening, but the May price was up 2c, compared with the early part of the week, and there was a natural halt and a tendency to wait a bit, coupled with selling for profit taking by smaller holders.

The Missouri state crop report was out and the souldtion of the growing winter wheat placed at 95. which was about as expected. The acreage, however, is 10 per cent under last year, according to the state report, while the government report, that was the feature yesternay, gave Missourl an acreage increase of 11 per cent compared with last year. Of the last year crop of winter wheat, the state report says 43 per cent is still on the tarms. The northwest had a falling off in receipts of 181 cars, getting 57 cars in all, against 552 last year. Minneapolis had 528 cars, against 390 last year, and Duluth 43, against 362. For the week, up to this morning, local elevator stocks have increased 1,400,000 bu. From all indications so far, there is a crop of large quantity, and the quality is very high. For the week, Argentine shipped \$8,000 bu, against 120,000 bu last week and 392,000 bu, in the corresponding week last year. Broomhall sent a cable later in which he said that conditions in Argentine remain uncertain owing to the weather, which is still unsettled.

Clearances for the day were 314,000 bu. The primary points had \$25,000 bu, against 339,000 bu.
