## THIRD JUDGE NEEDED

Some Telling Figures by Representative Rider for a Seventh District Bill.

The Two Judges There Are Overloaded—An Extra Nineteenth District Needed.

Representative H. A. Rider of Little Falls, who succeeded in having the bill for a third judge in the seventh judicial district passed thru the house, has an effective argument for his bill, which is now on the rocks in the senate. Mr. Rider has secured figures from every county of the state, showing its voting population, the number of civil cases on the calendar in 1932, and the number of indictments returned during the year. These give a fair idea of the work that is required of the different judges of the state.

### As Applied to the Seventh.

The average voting population in the seventh district is 32,972. The average number of civil cases for each one is 217, and the average number of indictments is 120. On this basis the seventh district is entitled to another judge. It now has 16,092 voters for each of its two judges, 306 civil cases and 49 indictments. With a third judge there would still be 16,092 voters, 237 civil cases and 33 indictments, a population over the average, and work less than the average. The fourth district with its two judges now has 3,165 voters for each one, 16 civil cases and 24 indictments, considerably less than the average. The fifth district has a smaller population but more litigation, giving each of its two judges 12,225 voters, 218 civil cases, and 27 indictments.

The figures show clearly how needless is the extra nineteenth district, a bill for which is about to pass the senate. The bill proposes to cut off from the first district the counties of Chicago, Pine and Kanabec. There are two judges now in the first district, and they have each a voting population of 8,745, with 150 civil cases and 24 indictments. This means that each judge has less than the average amount of litigation. The bill proposes to create a district by itself of three counties with a voting population of 5,168, 112 civil cases on the calendar last year, and 8 indictments. This judge would have considerably less than half the average work of a district judge, but the state would pay \$3,500 for his services and pay a court stenographer besides. The first district would be left with a voting population of 6,161 for each judge, 91 civil cases and 20 indictments, not enough work to keep them busy six months in the year.

**Facts Against Nineteenth.**  
The facts are all against the nineteenth district scheme, and in favor of the seventh district, but the first is going to succeed and the second to fail, if indications are correct.

Senator Schutts's bill to detach Lincoln county from the ninth district and give it to the twelfth will equalize things in that selection of the state in a sensible way. It will leave Judge Webster a voting population of 9,776, and give Judges Powers and Quale 20,431, or 10,215 each. The reduced ninth district had 230 civil cases and 27 indictments last year, and the augmented twelfth had 542 cases and 51 indictments.

**Figures for Hennepin.**  
Hennepin county's average for each judge is a voting population of 8,650, 281 civil cases and 67 indictments in each year. This is a small population but a high average of work for the judges.

**IT FREES THE "U."**  
Board of Control Limitation Bill Passes the House.

As far as the house is concerned, the university and normal schools may be freed from the board of control, except in the creation of their buildings. A bill to that effect was passed yesterday afternoon under suspension of the rules, by a vote of 79 to 19. It was first considered on general orders, where Mr. Shearer secured an amendment striking out the repealing clause, which it was feared might repeal the whole board of control law. When the committee case, Mr. Burns, who had opposed the other bills, joined with Mr. Shearer in getting a suspension of the rules and passing the bill. Mr. Anderson made an unsuccessful fight to get on an amendment in the interests of the Fairbault school.

The bill is now in the senate, where it will be substituted for the Comstock bill, now on general orders.

## CLASH SPOILS PLAN

Cottages for Dependent Widows of Veterans Not to Be Aided by State Appropriation.

Soldiers' Home and Anoka Plans Conflicted and the Committee Ignored Both.

Cottages for dependent widows of civil war veterans will not be built by state aid within the next two years. The appropriations committee turned a deaf ear to the plea, and the bill they reported does not contain a cent of the \$30,000 asked for the purpose. The clash between the soldiers' home and the Anoka cottage schemes is given by the committee as a reason for ignoring both.

Two bills already passed without the appropriations are worthless for the next two years. The money to erect the Vicksburg monument was not appropriated in the bill, which the governor has signed, and it is also cut out of the omnibus bill. So is the appropriation to be used by the forestry board in acquiring cut-over lands for forestry purposes. A bill has been passed giving authority to acquire such lands at \$2.50 an acre, but the authorities will not do much good without the money.

### RESTRICTED TAX AMENDMENTS

An Extremely Cautious Plan Adopted by the Senate.

Only one vote was recorded in the senate yesterday against the tax amendments proposed by the senate judiciary committee. The bill is wholly unsatisfactory to a large number of the strongest men in the senate, because it hedges the subject of taxation with so many restrictions that the hands of the legislature will be effectively tied should the people carry it thru at the next election. Senators O. G. Dale, Samuel Lord and F. H. Peterson spoke in favor of removing some of the restrictions, but made no headway, and the bill was formally passed by a vote of 50 to 1, the one belonging to Senator Dale.

The constitutional amendment which is proposed permits taxation of incomes, inheritances, mortgages and gross earnings, etc., but establishes such limitations and imposes such restrictions that the legislature will not have a great deal more power than at present. Still the measure is a distinct advance in some directions, and it was for this reason that Senators Lord and Peterson and other advocates of the so-called "wide-open" policy voted for it.
