MINNESOTA SPOILS THE ALIBI

Tanke Was Not at the Home of His Father on the Night of the Murder.

Old Friend of the Condemned Man Tells the Truth Now That the Case Is Settled.

Special to The Journal. New Uln, Minn., April 16.—A new witness in the Tanke case has turned up in the person of the hired man, who boarded with Tanke's father.

Tanke's alibi was that he was at his father's at the time when Folmer was said to have been shot, and that he brought a goose to the house before 3 o'clock.

The man says he and Frank came from the same part of Germany and were old friends, and for many years remained silent. His testimony would have destroyed Tanke's alibi, as all of his relatives at his father's swore that he spent the evening with them.

DISTRICT COURT INJUNCTION Keepers of a Blind Pig and Infamous Resort Are Brought Up Short.


