## LONG TIME IN JAIL

## Chris Norbeck Detailed at County Bastille Longer Than Intended.

Ames trial and has not yet been returned to the penitentiary. Later diphtheria broke out in the county jail and the place was quarantined so that removal was impossible. The ex-detention will probably be returned to his enforced home the first of next week.



## FOR HOLY SERVICE

Ascension Catholic Church Dedicated Yesterday With Elaborate and Impressive Ceremonies.

Archbishop Ireland, Bishop McGolrick and Many of the Clergy Take Part.

Ascension church, Bryant and Eighteenth avenues N., was dedicated yesterday with elaborate and impressive services. This new church has been erected at a cost of \$60,000 and is an ornament to the North Side and a credit to the Catholic community in the country. The interior altar is one of the finest in the country.

The exercises properly began with a procession of the Catholic organizations of the city which assembled at Hennepin and Third and marched to the church by way of Washington and Plymouth avenues, headed by the Journal Newsboys' band. John Mosser had charge as chief marshal. The place of honor was held by the Holy Name society of the Ascension church, whose banner was borne by the oldest four members, John Garrity, D. McGrath, John Molay and James Gleason. Following came the Catholic Knights of America, uniform ranks; Ancient Order of Hibernians, eight local divisions; St. Joseph German Catholic Benevolent society; St. Boniface German Catholic Benevolent society; St. Cyril Slavonic Catholic Benevolent society; Catholic Order of Foresters, eleven local courts.

As the procession approached the church, the structure was crowded with people while the clergy conducted the first portions of the dedicatory ritual. Archbishop Ireland, followed by Bishop McGolrick and a train of priests and acolytes afterwards marched around the church, the archbishop sprinkling holy water on the walls. After the remainder of the private services had been conducted the crowd was admitted, the societies being honored with reserved seats. Only a portion of those desiring admission could be accommodated, as the church was overflowing.

Archbishop Ireland in the dedicatory sermon took for his text "The Ascension." In his closing comments he pointed out the parish on its new edifice, which was the result of the most devoted work for the parish was neither large nor wealthy. The sermon was followed by a second mass, the services continuing from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m. The clergy present aside from the archbishop and Bishop McGolrick were the Rev. Messrs. Harrington, deacon; X. McDermott, sub-deacon; Danahy, master of ceremonies; J. M. Cleary, James O'Reilly, Hartigan, O. P., and L. F. Harrison, St. Joseph's parish.

In the evening Bishop McGolrick preached. The assisting priests being Rev. T. Mahoney, St. Mary's church; Rev. P. O'Neill, St. Michael's; Rev. J. O'Connor, St. James; Very Rev. J. C. Byrne, St. Patrick's; Rev. John Ryan of the seminary; Very Rev. H. Mayhew, D. D., and Very Rev. T. Moore, president and vice president of St. Thomas college, all of St. Paul, and the Rev. Father McDavitt of Minneapolis.
