ANOTHER HEAVY DRIVE BY THE BEARS IN WHEAT

September Sells Off to 835/8c, December to 791/2c and May Closes at 811/20.

New Crop Advices From Australia | Ma and Argentine Help the Bears Greatly.

Exports for the Week Very Light -Local Stocks Increase 650,000 Bu.

Minnespolis Chamber of Commerce, Sept. 18.—Still another day of free selling in wheat, of weakness and lower prices, of discouraging talk and discouraged bulls. September wheat was so sick that at the opening Sic was the best figure obtainable. Other opticus were off as well, December to 19%c and May to 81%c. It seemed impossible to find any good support, and prices weakened on the offering of very moderate lots. Chicago was bearish as ever and sent out reports even more depressing than those of yesterday. The foreign markets were weak and lower, which was reason for a weaker feeling at export centers, and with it all there was better weather over the west and southwest and the prospects of good weather to come. Paris was a full cent off and Liverpool was lower at the epening. An improvement is reported in the weather outlook over all continental Europe. Reports from Argentine were confirmatory of earlier estimates of increased acreage and with them came a cry from a new quarter. Australian cables brought the gist of a preliminary report covering Victoria, where the promise is for a 24,800,000 bu crop. Traders will remember the stimulation to prices caused by the poor Australian yield of last season, and the important buil news that came later on from the Pacific coast when Australisn demands became so keen that the coast was scraped bare of wheat to meet it. And it will be remembered that even later than this some wheat from the Canadian northwest moved west to the coast and down to Australia, while the Minneapolis flour mills entered orders for flour to go to Melbourne and Sydney, and even away round coast to Adelaide. Hence the faliure of the Australian crop (insignificant as the figures may appear relative to the world's production) was an important factor for price maintenance, and so the bears were pointing this morning to the report of a good yield in prospect as a potent bear argument. India is shipping heavily this week, and one authority nazarded the estimate that in the Monday figures of world's ship

bearish.

The spring wheat territory has splendid conditions for threshing and the movement. The quality of the Nebraska crop is further lowered by too much moisture and unfavorable weather. Rains have fallen in sections where fall plowing was being delayed by dry weather.

Great disappointment was felt by the bulls when the Bradstreet's report of the clearances for the week came in, showing only 1,000,000 bu, the lightest in a long time. Prices broke again and at the close December was down to 79½c. May to 81½c and September 83%c, all closing weak at low point of the day.

No. 1 northern sold off to 85c, altho some business was done as high as 86c. No. 2 northern sold from 84c to 82½c. Sellers found it hard to get top figures for anything.


