ROADS TIED UP IN NORTH DAKOTA

SNOW DRIVEN BY A FORTY-EIGHT-MILE WIND.

East Bound Train on the Northern Pacific Stalled at New Salem—Rotaries Will Have to Work Two Days Before the Soo's Track Can Be Cleared—Temperature at a Low Point.

Bismarck, N. D., Feb. 2.—The temperature fell last night from 37 degrees above zero to 13 below, a drop of 50 degrees, and wind that attained a velocity of 48 miles an hour drove the snow in a raging blizzard. All railroad trains on three roads leading out of this city were suspended last night. On the Northern Pacific road the east-bound train was tied up at New Salem at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon and had not moved at 8 o'clock this morning. No. 1, the west-bound limited on the Northern Pacific reached here ten hours late.

On the Washburn road all the locomotives are tied up at different places and the road has no engine to send out with a snow plow to clear the tracks. The Soo road train was tied up yesterday at Kulm and it will take two days' work with a rotary plow to clear the track for the resumption of traffic.

A rotary plow started out from Wishek this morning to clear the track of drifts. A melting temperature yesterday made the snow soft and heavy and when driven by a high wind it formed an impassable barrier on all tracks.

The storm broke about 11 o'clock this forenoon. The weather is clear, calm and cold.

HIGH WINDS ON THE PLAINS

Sixty-Mile Gale at Helena—Severe Day in North Dakota.

Butte, Mont., Feb. 2.—Advises received from throughout the state tell of a terrific wind storm last night. At Helena the wind reached a velocity of sixty miles an hour. Tin roofs were torn off and several small buildings were overturned.

At Big Timber a small dwelling was moved bodily over ten feet, several chimneys were overturned and much damage was done to plate glass windows and signs. Fortunately there was little or no snow on the ranges or great losses to stock would have occurred.

Jameson, N. D., Feb. 2.—The worst blizzard of the season raged here. The east-bound train is in the snow on the Yellowstone division. The west-bound limited was held here for better weather.

Osakis, Minn., Feb. 2.—The worst blizzard of the winter swept this region yesterday. A heavy fall of snow, with wind from the southeast, continued all day. The mercury was at zero.

Fargo, N. D., Feb. 2.—An old-fashioned blizzard prevailed over the entire state yesterday, with the wind in the southwest, and the temperature mild till last night, when the zephyrs shifted to the northwest.

BODY ON THE PILOT

Section Man Struck and Killed During the Storm.

Mandan, N. D., Feb. 2.—Two passenger trains are tied up by the storm between Mandan and Sims, and last night's west-bound north coast limited is now here waiting for the road west to be cleared.

No. 4 last night struck a section man named Nels Slavan at Kurtz, and when the train reached Sims he was found on the pilot of the engine. He died two hours after.

It is expected all trains will be moving to-day.

Cold in the Peninsula

Houghton, Mich., Feb. 2.—To-day was the coldest of the extremely cold weather of the past two weeks, the temperature reaching 23 degrees below. From interior districts much colder weather is reported. Train service has been irregular and outside labor is impeded by the low temperature.

La Crosse in It, of Course.

La Crosse, Feb. 2.—A fierce north-west wind driving sheets of snow before it made life outdoors almost unbearable to-day. The temperature is falling rapidly and residents are preparing for the worst stage of weather of the winter.

RAILROADS.

PAYS MORE TAXES

D. M. & N. Becomes a Three Per Cent Road.

The Duluth, Missabe & Northern has become a 3 per cent road, and its payment for 1903 is much heavier than before. The earnings, as reported to the state auditor yesterday, were \$4,879,675.44, and the taxes paid were \$146,390.65. Last year the 2 per cent tax came to \$108,527.61. The Minnesota & North Wisconsin earned \$251,092.83, and as it is a new road and only pays 1 per cent, the tax is \$25,109.28.

The Great Northern Express company reported its gross earnings in Minnesota as \$294,080.32. It paid the railroad \$117,632.13 for transportation, leaving taxable earnings of \$176,448.19, and the 6 per cent tax is \$10,586.89. The American Express company earned \$121,027.19, and paid for transportation \$60,513.59, leaving \$60,513.60 of taxable earnings. The tax at 6 per cent is \$3,630.81.

WILL GO THRU CHICAGO

G. P. A. of Great Western Looking for Expo Business.

J. P. Elmer, general passenger agent of the Great Western, does not believe that the direct lines from the twin cities to St. Louis will have a great advantage over the Chicago lines in getting the exposition business.

Of course it is hard to tell anything about the traffic now, but that is the way it looks to me. As yet we have made no arrangements for tour trains.

By leaving the twin cities at night the excursionists can spend the day in Chicago and then go to St. Louis, arriving there in the morning. Or they can get the forenoon train out of Chicago. The people who will attend the fair will be on a sightseeing trip, and if they can take in Chicago at the same rate I think many of them would prefer that route.

The morning is the best time to arrive in a large city, as the rooms at the hotels are usually given up then, and it is easier to get accommodations, and then after breakfast start out on a day's pleasure.

SOLD NO BONDS
