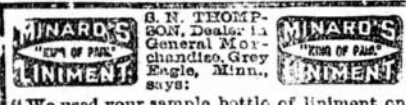

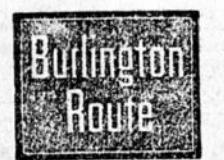

## INTERSTATE NAT. GUARDS MEET

BOBLETER AND LAMBERT PROMINENT AT ST. AUGUSTINE.

Resolutions of Minnesota Officers Indorsed By the Big Association and Lambert's Report on Needed Legislation Adopted Without Change—Next Meeting to Be Held in Minnesota in June.

Lake City, Minn., Feb. 10.—General Joseph Bobleter and Major George C. Lambert have returned from the interstate national guard meeting at St. Augustine, Fla., and report a harmonious gathering. Every resolution adopted by the late convention of Minnesota officers and referred to the association was adopted. Major Lambert was chosen to draft the report of the committee which had charge of needed legislation. The committee concurred in his report, which was adopted by the convention without change.

Among the recommendations were: An increase of the federal appropriation from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000; penalty envelopes for officers of the national guard; authorizing state authorities to contract for and purchase quartermaster supplies and clothing under government specifications and inspection, to be paid for by the government; allowance of forage for the artillery, and an increase in the number of camps of maneuvers.

General Charles Dick was re-elected president. Colonel John G. Salsman of Wisconsin, secretary, and Colonel C. E. Blyer of New York, treasurer. The army appropriation bill before congress prevented General Dick from attending, and the veteran vice president, General Patrick H. Barry of Nebraska, presided.

These officers were in the contest for the location of the next convention, Pittsburgh, Pa., Columbus, S. C., and St. Paul. The last named city won out easily, and the next week in June was decided upon for holding the convention.

## SHOW UP WELL

Properties of Duluth and Superior Iron and Steel Company Are Producing Fine Ore.

According to reports from the head of the lakes, the properties held by the Duluth and Superior Iron and Steel company are showing very high indication of being valuable "finds."

This company owns 780 acres of land in three groups on the famous Mesaba Iron range on the road of the Great Northern, which passes through the north end of one of the properties and runs close to the others. The ore is Bessemer, running very low in phosphorus, and is in high demand on that account.

On one of their properties they have about 150,000 tons of ore mined on the stock pile, which will run at least 43 per cent, and they expect to ship at least 150,000 tons more, making 300,000 tons of ore in all from this property alone this year. They propose to run a railroad right down on the bed after the surface is stripped and use steam shovels, which reduces the cost of getting the ore to the water front per ton. The estimated profit on this ore, deducting all the expense of mining, marketing and incidentals, will probably net the company about \$1.50 per ton.

In order to take care of immediate improvements and to provide funds for the development of the property, the company is selling a limited amount of the stock at 50 cents per share for a short time.

A new feature of the offerings of the Duluth and Superior Iron and Steel company is the protection of the investor by the issuance of a guaranty gold bond, written by the Pacific Union Trust company, which insures the investor against the loss of his original capital. The Pacific Union Trust company is a company with resources running well into the millions.

The Northwestern office of this company, located at 421 Andrus building, Minneapolis, under the management of Mr. Wm. P. Mason, is handling the stock offered. Offices are maintained in St. Paul at 317 Manhattan building.

Other undeveloped properties of the company are showing up well under tests and will doubtless render substantial returns under development.

It would appear that with the safeguards taken to protect the investor and the apparently bright future of the company, that the investment offered should appeal to the man looking for a chance to "turn over" his money.
