DYING GAMBLER FORGIVES SLAYER

Fatally Shot in Holiday Crowd on Broadway, Victim Absolves Prisoner.

New York, Nov. 25.—Guy Roche, who was shot twice under the heart in front of the Hotel Marlborough last evening, identified Frank Felton, whom the police had to identify as the man who shot him, when the prisoner was brought before him in the hospital today. In the presence of Felton and two detectives, Roche said that the shooting was justified.

From the moment Roche was taken to the hospital after the shooting in the midst of the holiday crowd on Broadway, the surgeon told him that his case was almost hopeless. The surgeons joined with the police in pleading with the wounded man to name his assailant, but every request had met with a refusal until early today.

"If I live, I'll settle the case myself; if I die, let it go at that," was his only answer. Today, however, after the physicians had told Roche that he had practically no chance for recovery, he consented to have Felton brought before him, and said he would identify him as the man who fired the shot. When the prisoner was brought to the wounded man's bedside, Roche said:

"Yes, Frank shot me, but he was justified. I would have done the same to him." Then, addressing Felton, who had apparently not been moved in the least by this declaration, the dying gambler said:

"Goody, Frank, old boy. I don't blame you." Roche told the detectives that he and Felton had quarreled, but that he could not recall the cause of the trouble. At the close of the interview the wounded gambler was taken away and said to him:

"Won't you shake hands, Frank?" Felton did not reply and did not appear to notice Roche's request. "Oh, don't act like that, Frank. We're old pals, shake hands with me," cried Roche.

Felton did not turn his head and the detectives then took him away. Felton, who denied he fired the shot, was later arraigned in police court and held without bail for examination next Sunday. The police believe that the trouble between Roche and Felton which culminated in the shooting arose over a woman who had transferred her affections from Roche to Felton.

SIX MILES OF FREIGHT IN PITTSBURG YARDS

Pittsburg, Nov. 25.—Six miles of freight cars loaded with products of the mills in the lower Monongahela valley, block the yards of the Pittsburg, Virginia & Charleston railroad at the Homestead plant and hundreds of other cars are awaiting shipment. While the congestion is not complete and some freight is being moved, the production has reached that point where the railroads are seriously handicapped in the way of motive power. There is also a serious shortage of cars. The same condition exists at the Duquesne plants, and the big yards in the vicinity of Oliver Holloway are filled with loaded cars.

HAIRED BY SHOCK, HE IS PARALYZED

California Art Student Strapped to Electric Chair and Current Turned On.

San Francisco, Nov. 25.—The Examiner today tells a story of hazing practiced by students of the Hopkins Institute of Art in this city which, in one case, resulted in a student being seriously injured to the youthful victim. A student named A. T. De Rome was, it is said, strapped to a chair with a metal seat, an imitation of the instrument for execution, and an electric current was then turned on the chair. As a result, according to the story, De Rome's body has been paralyzed from the hips downward.

Other cases of mistreatment of newly entered students by the upper classes are narrated in connection with initiation ceremonies.

REOHR WILL PRESS A PERJURY CHARGE

Special to The Journal. New York, Nov. 25.—Charles D. Reohr, the former Minneapolis attorney charged with the theft of a diamond pin, and was honorably discharged next morning, says he will go before District Attorney Jerome today and present charges of perjury against Detective Melver Reohr. Reohr says he is determined to follow up the detective and that he has brought a civil suit and will lay the facts before Police Commissioner A. A. Cooch. Captain Cottrell of the Tenderloin division is investigating the case. He thinks Melver acted on the idea that he was doing his duty in arresting Reohr.

15 HURT IN CRASH OF TRAM AND TROLLEY

Cleveland, Nov. 25.—Fifteen persons were injured, three and possibly more are seriously hurt, as a result of a collision between the fast southbound train on the Cleveland & Pittsburg road and a trolley car on the Northern Ohio Traction Co. line at Bedford. The trolley was struck by the passenger train while the latter was running fully fifty miles an hour.
