TRUCK GARDENERS SCOOP IN \$1,750,000

MARKET MEN WILL CLOSE PROF-ITABLE YEAR.

Crops, in Spite of Drawbacks, Have Been Abundant and of Good Quality and Demand Has Been Equal to Supply-Dealers Plan Coup in Potato

The Minneapolis "garden-truck" market, which will close Nov. 1, has had the most successful season it has ever enjoyed, in spite of early drawbacks in the spring. Participating gardeners have received during the season nearly \$1,750,000 cash for their garden produce.

produce.

At the opening of the season, things looked somewhat gloomy. The high water drowned out many gardeners who for years past have been prominent in bringing in early garden products. So unsuccessful were the early crops in some instances, that these "regulars" of former days even refrained from renting stalls and those who did have early crops fit for market were able to get good, stiff prices. When the season was in full blast, with the coming cf the warm summer months, 500 gardeners were daily to be found at the market stalls.

Melons Dwindle Away.

Melons Dwindle Away.

At the present time, the melon season is just about in its last days; while the final season for the market-gardener, the days of the "root-crops," are at hand. This has been a record season for both quality and quantity of home-grown musk and watermelons, and in spite of the profusion the fruit has found ready sale and at profitable figures.

The gardeners report that the "root-crops" are also exceptionally fine. These include potatoes, turnips, carrots, onions, etc. Tho the general market season is well advanced, there is as yet little difference to be seen in the supply of "truck" offered at the market. This morning, the market gardener reports, there were seventy-five varieties of garden products offered. varieties of garden products offered.

Coup in Potatoes.

At the present time there is an interesting little game going on in the potato market, something of an innovation in the experience of market gardeners. The Minneapolis market has proched a point where its questions are reached a point where its quotations are being accepted as the prevailing mar-ket price thruout the city among grocers and general dealers in garden prod-nets. Tho the potato crop is fully equal this year to last, the amount of pota-toes offered for sale in much less and the market is accordingly higher. It seems that large handlers of potatoes are sending buyers to meet the market gardeners at Minnehaha, and other routes much patronized by the incommitted by the incommi routes much patronized by the incoming truck farmers. In the outskirts of the city the buyers for the large dealers purchase the potatoes and place them in storage. Thus, they are keeping up the price of potatoes on the Minneapolis market because of the supply being cut down in amount offered on the market and thus are profitably carrying on an unusual method of speculation.

officers of the Minneapolis Market Garden company report that the company's income this year from all sources will be about \$20,000, about the same as last season. The principal source of this income is rental of market stalls.

TAX SALES NOVEMBER 12

STATE AUDITOR DIRECTS COUNTY AUDITORS TO HOLD ALL ON SAME DAY.

State Auditor Iverson has sent out instructions to the county auditors for holding the annual forfeited tax sales. holding the annual forfeited tax sales. They will be held in every county on Nov. 12, and nothing bid in for the state in 1902 and succeeding years may be sold for less than the full amount of taxes, penalties, interest and costs. Owners may redeem by paying the amount due with 12 per cent interest from day of sale.

This will be the record sale held under the law of 1902. Last year about \$250,000 was realized from the sales. In Hennepin county there was \$25,802.81 realized, and in Ramsey \$22,383.32.
