ESTATE CUT OFF, MRS. PLATT SUES

Plot of Sons and Senator to Shut Out Wife as Divorcee Motive.

New York, Oct. 3.—The real motive for Mrs. Thomas Collier Platt's campaign of divorce against her husband has been revealed. It was her discovery that Senator Platt, shrewdly foreseeing an exposure of his matrimonial troubles, had transferred a large part of his estate to his three sons and other relatives.

Close friends of the old senator insist that he thus impoverished himself solely to exclude his wife from any substantial pecuniary benefit in the event of his death.

Utterly estranged by the developments of the transatlantic tour, in which the coachman, Hedges, figured as an invited guest and the famed escort of Mrs. Platt, the senator and his wife maintain the outward semblance of amity. But, although living under the same roof and appearing occasionally in public together, they rarely exchanged a word—save in bitter anger and vituperation.

Dog's Nurse "Go-Between."

The go-between in the divided home was the highly paid nurse employed by Mrs. Platt, for the exclusive care of her favorite and ailing poodle. She was the human telephone thru which the estranged pair did their necessary talking.

The final break came when Mrs. Platt learned that the senator had reduced his estate, practically to bare bones. It was then that Mrs. Platt decided upon an action for divorce, designed to bring the senator's family, father and sons, to her feet with offers of compromise. But, she was in this shape when the published story of the astonishing wrangle disarranged all plans.

Mrs. Platt having failed in a determined effort to effect a mutual protection combine with the unforgiving senator, frankly admitted the estrangement. She verified the published story of the troubles, denounced the senator as foremost among her enemies, and threatened an exposure that would be sensational.

Hedges There, Too.

Thru it all Hedges, the coachman, was present by order of Mrs. Platt and, as she told the story of her alleged wrongs, her bright black eyes read his face for warning frowns or looks of approval.

Mrs. Platt looked positively bright and almost happy as she made her statement. Her voice was steady and clear.

"I will talk right to the point," she began, with a swift side glance of seeming amusement into the narrow gray eyes of her coachman. "I am the victim of a wicked plot concocted by my husband, and my son-in-law, Colonel Francis J. Carmody. They hope to ruin me, but I shall make them suffer."

"I am no weakling and am well prepared to take care of myself. Not content with hounding me, they planned to wreck my daughter's happiness and reputation; but I was wide awake and Colonel Carmody and his detestable friend will soon learn that they have aroused a lion, and not a lamb."

"Ever since my marriage," she exclaimed, "I have been scorned, sneered at and insulted."

"The senator's relatives have persecuted me with the most relentless vindictiveness. They have hounded me beyond the limit of human endurance. This published story that connects my name with that of Mr. Hedges is simply a cunning plot to ruin me."

Halting an instant for a conference of eyes with the coachman, Mrs. Platt continued: "Now, don't think that I am manufacturing a story, because as a matter of fact, I can prove every word of it. I can prove that only my threat to leave Senator Platt prevented the presence of that transatlantic tour of a woman—a senator's wife—whose name and that of Senator Platt were linked by scandal in Washington, which was still under the impression that many Mae Woods in this case and full details are in my possession."

He still adores her and will not permit a word to be said against her. He insists that Mrs. Carmody would fly to him were she not restrained and influenced by her mother.

When told that Mrs. Carmody had retained counsel and that mother and daughter contemplated freeing themselves from matrimonial bonds at the same time, Colonel Carmody said:

"It is possible that my dear wife has been influenced to bring an action against me for a separation or limited divorce. She can't possibly have grounds, but she may bring suit. I want it understood that I have never given Mrs. Carmody grounds for leaving me and I sincerely believe that she will return to me when she sees the error of her ways. As for this suit, I have no fear of it."

Ready for Hedges.

"It is also said, Colonel, that Senator Platt has insisted himself to have your resignation asked for by the United States district attorney."

Colonel Carmody laughed heartily. "It is all right," he returned. "The more of that sort of thing that is done the better. I laugh at such talk. My tenure of office does not depend upon the whim of anyone."

It was stated that Colonel Carmody, impressed by various threats made against him, has employed two prominent firms of attorneys to protect his interests. One of these firms is skilled in the criminal branches of the law and the other is among the leading firms in civil practice at the New York bar. Carmody says that he will have Hedges taken care of if he attempts to make good his alleged threat to visit physical

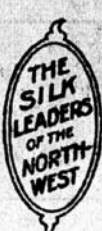

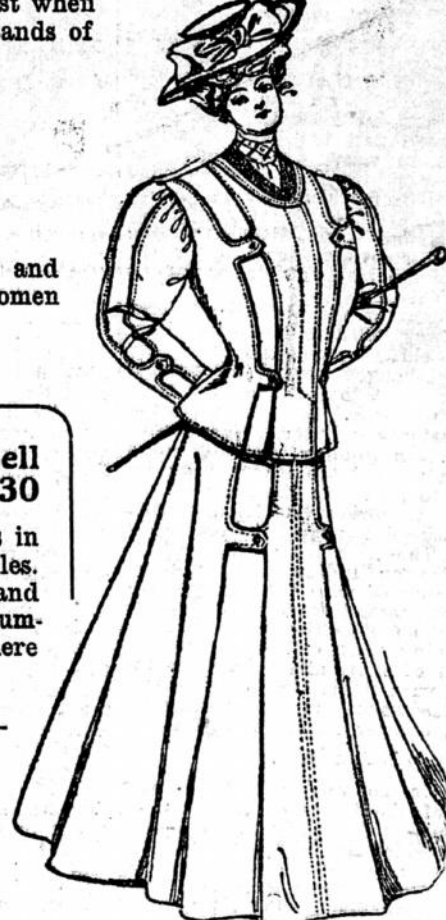
