Special Commission Appointed by Governor to Meet January 3.

The first meeting of the commission for the care and rchabilitation of Virginians returning from the war will be held in this city January 3, according to an announcement from the office of Governor Westmoreland Invis. The commission was authorized by a joint resolution at the last General Assembly. Its principal work will be to find suitable employment for Virginia men returning to the State from abroad.

Governor Davis has Just appointed the five members of the commission which he was intrusted with selecting by the ruling of the Legislature. They are: Colonel Charles E. Hasbrook, of Richmond: former State Senator Eugene Withers, of Danville: Senator Walter E. Addison, of Lynchburg: former Senator Ben R. Gunter, of Accomac, and Clarence Burns, of Lebanon.

The personnel of the commission consists further of five members of the Senate and five members of the House of Delegates.

Bailey, of Lynchburg, who has died since the recess of the House, and Speaker Houston will have to name a successor to him.

LANDLORDS AND TENANTS ARE STILL HAVING WAR

Calculated on 5 Per Cent Basis, Annual Charge Would Reach 8450,000,000, He Says.

LONDON. December 23.—One London banker estimates that Germany will have to pay to the allies for reparation and restitution about \$7,500,000,-200. Calculated on a 5 per cent basis, with a 1 per cent sinking fund, this would mean an annual charge on the German revenue of \$450,000,000. He says there can be no question of Germanys ability to meet this demand. It is impossible, he says, discussing the subject in a newspaper article, to damages and robberies in the invaded territory. Russin's 512 State-Controlled Mills and Factories Prove Consistent Losers,

EERNE, December 22.—Reliable intermation from Russia brings confimation of reports that the socialization of industry there is a complete railare. Official statistics show that in aimost all the 513 mills and factories controlled by the State expenses have considerably exceeded receipts.

During the first four months of 1918 the government paid out more than 1900,000,000 rubles to cover these deficits and has been obliged up to the present to advance 1,000,000,000 rubles to the factories under its control.

Technical experts assert that Russian industry has been cripilled formany years to come by the Bolshevik regime.


